

BEER BAN TAKES EFFECT SUNDAY IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Thirsty Washingtonians will have to journey to the city if they wish to buy beer today.

R. E. Thornbury, operator of a restaurant here, is the only man with an establishment not affected by the state liquor board's ban on Sunday beer sales, effective midnight tonight.

Thornbury's place has been exempted from the order pending completion of a test case which is still before the supreme court. He has until August 27 in which to petition for a rehearing in his case.

Liquor board officials have stated that intention of strictly enforcing the law and county prosecutors, at a meeting held last week, have offered their cooperative support.

Other sections of the 1930 closing law, under which the ban is used, including theatres, baseball games, pool halls etc., may or may not be included depending upon the various prosecuting attorneys. They have the power to close all establishments except drug stores and "livery stables" should they care to do so, the court has ruled.

Thornbury county Prosecutor, Smith, said tonight that county prosecutors agreed to full cooperation with the board but that they left the enforcement of the law as it pertains to amusements up to other authorities. The prosecutors, Troy said, are mainly interested in the prosecution of cases rather than forcing the arrests.

He added, however, that county sheriffs and city police have the power to close such amusements, should they see fit to do so.

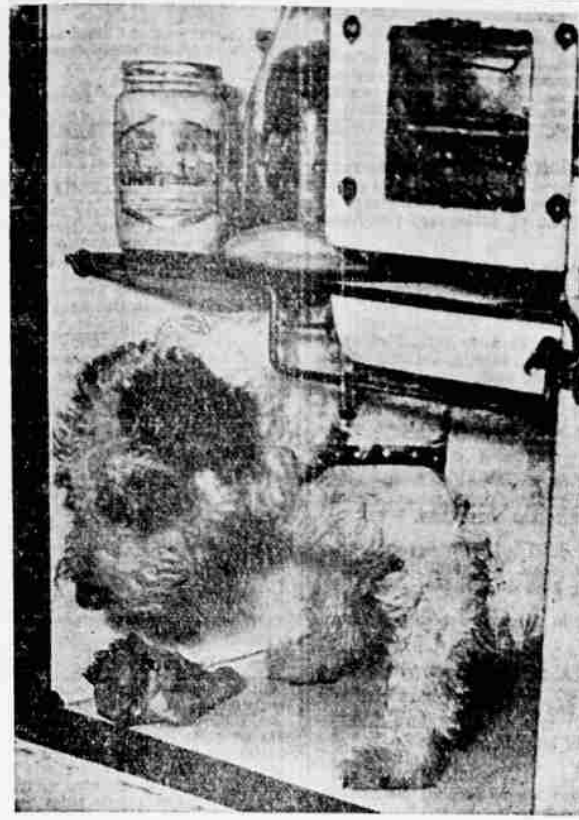

POULTRYMEN WILL PICNIC AUGUST 15

The annual Lane county poultrymen's picnic will be held at Benton-Lane park about six miles north of Junction City on the West Side Pacific highway Sunday, August 15, under the auspices of the Lane County Agricultural council, the Lane County Poultrymen's association, other cooperating poultry associations and the county agent.

The picnic will start with a basket dinner at 12:30 p. m. Ice-cream, coffee, sugar, and cream will be furnished free. Following the dinner there will be short addresses by H. E. Cosby, head of the poultry department of the Oregon Agricultural college; G. C. Keener, manager of the Pacific Co-operative Poultry Producers; C. W. Norton, manager of the Northwest Poultry and Dairy Products company; and L. W. Brookshier, manager of the Eugene branch of Swift and company. These men will speak on subjects of interest to all Lane county poultrymen.

Other features of the picnic will be special musical numbers and a program of sports and stunts for all.

All Lane County poultry producers and their families and friends are invited to attend this picnic, it is announced.

The poultry organizations of Lane county decided last year to hold only one picnic in Lane county each year. It was agreed that the 1937 picnic would be held near Junction City and that the 1938 picnic would be held near Eugene.

NAZI GOVERNMENT MAY RETALIATE TO BRITISH ACT

LONDON, Aug. 7.—(AP)—A hint of possible retaliatory action was given by the German embassy today after cancellation by the government of permits of three German newspaper correspondents to reside in Britain.

The correspondents were Werner Von Crome, chief London correspondent of the Berlin Lokalanzeiger; Herr Wrede, a colleague of Von Crome, and Wolf Von Langen, London representative of the Graeflich-schach news agency. Permits of women secretaries of Von Crome and Von Langen also were revoked. All concerned but Von Crome have left London.

A German embassy official said today in discussing the incident:

"Details of the expulsion have been forwarded to Berlin, where future action will be decided. It is not known whether retaliatory action will be taken against British correspondents in Berlin."

Usually reliable sources reported the men were suspected of espionage, but Von Crome said he was innocent of such activity.

The British government had complained, it was reported, to the Nazi government of the "improper activities" of the journalists.

It was understood von Crome had appealed to Joachim von Ribbentrop, German ambassador to Great Britain, who, after examining the cancellations, had refused to intervene.

Von Crome was visited by police of the alien squad nine days ago and told that he must leave. When he asked the reason, the police replied that they couldn't say because "we received the order from high quarters."

The action, it was believed, was the result of examination by police of papers of an alleged German spy, understood to have been arrested two months ago.

POPE WARNS NAZIS THAT PRESENT PLAN MIGHT KICK BACK

CASTEL GANDOLFO, Italy, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The pope warned Germany in an address today that its course in impeding Catholic education will lead to misfortune.

The pope, with renewed vigor, addressed 1,500 pilgrims, including groups from Boston, Mass., and elsewhere in the United States.

Upholding Christian education and evidently referring to Germany, he raised his voice and said:

"Catholic education is being fought in a country which is not outside Europe but in Europe. We are not prophets of misfortune but are prophetic about what this nation's inevitable future will be.

"To complain and cry will be useless unless recourse is immediately taken in Christian education."

GEORGIA SEEKING RETURN OF BURNS

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 7.—(AP)—Georgia shaped today an appeal to federal courts for the return to its changing of Robert Elliott Burns and other less noted fugitives who have found haven in northern states.

Governor E. D. Rivers instructed assistant attorney general W. H. Duckworth and Marshall Allison to confer with U. S. district Attorney Lawrence Camp on possible mandamus action against states which have denied extradition of escaped prisoners because of Georgia's penal system.

Efforts to reach Burns in Newark, N. J., where he runs a tax consultant's service, were unavailing and New Jersey officials withheld comment.

In June, 1922, Burns, a war veteran, escaped from the Campbell county chain gang while serving six to ten years for a four dollar holdup. He was recaptured in June, 1929, in Chicago, where he had become the registered publisher of a trade magazine.

Returned in custody, he escaped in September of the same year. Taken again in December of 1932 in New Jersey, he fought extradition and Governor A. Harry Moore refused to turn him over to Georgia officers.

COUPLE KILLED AS CAR DROPS 300 FEET

BIG BEAR, Calif., Aug. 7.—(AP)—Howard Dorsey, 32, newly-elected Los Angeles city councilman, and Marian G. Lonabough, 23, were killed today when Dorsey's automobile crashed down a 300-foot canyon wall on the Rim of the World highway near Lakeview Point, 15 miles from here.

BERLIN, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The Nazi labor service organ "Arbeitsmann" complained today that there was not a single news reel or radio company or newspaper in the United States which have "honest, objective" reports about Nazi Germany. "They are nearly all in Jewish hands," it was said.

WORLD OFFERED LIGHTNING DATA

LONDON.—(AP)—Sixteen million thunderstorms sweep the earth every year.

Taking into account an average of 20 seconds between two lightning bolts, mankind must get used to the idea that 100 lightning flashes rip across the skies around this globe every second.

These figures have been gathered by Dr. Popowsky, the German meteorologist.

According to Dr. Popowsky, a thunderstorm is the result of a "thermic bubble" caused by sun-heated air quickly rising into the cooler heights of the heavens.

Thunderclouds carry up to 200,000 tons of rain, sufficient to fill 6000 big rail trucks.

Two German scientists, Renard and Hochschweuder, have constructed a "thunderstorm machine."

They have estimated from it that tension accumulated in a large thundercloud could be anything up to 5,000,000,000 volts.

This tension, together with electric power quantities from 20,000 amperes, which would suffice to supply a big country with electric power for a whole year if it could be collected and utilized.

PICKING OF EARLY HOPS DUE TO BEGIN AROUND AUGUST 23

Picking of early hops in the Eugene trade area will start about August 23, although a yard or two may start a few days ahead of that date. There are few hops for early picking in this section, however, the main crop coming with the 'late hops. In the Salem area some 'ards will start picking around August 10 on early hops due to the red spider threat.

Late hops will be harvested around September 5 or 6, according to the outlook now, coming on a bit late this year. The hops crop in the Eugene area is looking fine at present and is producing more hops than last year, although not a normal crop.

There is no market activity on hops at this time, due partially to the fact there is a large crop in California and Washington and elsewhere in Oregon. Last year, buyers and contract people were scouting in this section at this time but no activity is reported here so far this year.

SAGA OF INDIANS WILL DEFY TIME

PHILADELPHIA.—(AP)—The literature, history and songs of the American Indian dying under the stress of fast modern life, are being preserved in a group of anthropologists interested in the philosophy of the "first inhabitants of America."

Dr. Frank G. Speck, professor of anthropology at the University of Pennsylvania, an authority on Indian life, is helping to record for posterity the saga of the red races. Records are being made of primitive dances, hymns of praise and hate, the incantations of medicine men and all the rites of a war-pew-wow.

Modern mass production has taken Indian made from the ancient trades of weaving and pottery-making and swing music and dancing have outmoded the age-old Sun Dance. That in the main has sounded the death knell of Indian art and life as a distinctive part of America, according to Dr. Speck.

Indian tribes, including the Iroquois, the Delawares and other groups, at first feared that the records would be a source of ridicule at the hands of white men, but they assented to Dr. Speck's request when he assured them that learned men wanted to study their customs by that unique method.

One Deskaheh of the Cayuga tribe became so interested in the work that he offered to conduct the recordings personally. Thus modern science, the chief reason for the decline of Indian civilization, according to many, is helping to memorialize its victim.
