

FAIR FISHING IN FOREST AREA OVER WEEK-END REPORTED

Fishing conditions in the Willamette national forest this week-end are considered as being fair, particularly in Lane county, with Linn and Marion counties reporting conditions as being good. Most of the streams are quite low at this period of the year, and ideal summer fishing conditions do not prevail, according to a report made Friday by forest officials.

McKenzie District: The McKenzie river, South Fork, Blue river and Horse creek are all considered fair fishing streams for this coming week-end. A number of limit catches have been reported from all of the above streams, though most of the fish being caught are small, particularly those from the smaller streams. Flies with yellow bodies, particularly caddis flies, are reported as being the best lures. Many different flies are hatching in the higher country; consequently, lake fishing is becoming more inviting than stream fishing. The mosquitoes in the high country are gradually disappearing so that lake fishing is much more enjoyable. Horse, Cliff, Mink and Nash lakes are regarded as good for this week-end while Hidden, Porky Tokatee, Honey and Henson lakes are regarded as being fair. Linton and Melakawa lakes are regarded as poor.

All of the roads in this district are open though rough and dusty. Oakridge District: Generally speaking the Oakridge district is regarded as being fair for this week-end though certain sections are considered as good. Salt creek, Salmon creek and the North Fork of the Willamette are regarded as being better than the other streams. Salt creek probably is the best bet. Several parties are constantly making limit catches in both Salt creek and Salmon creek. The upper portion of the Willamette river in the vicinity of Hilden is considered as being good and most of the lakes in the Taylor Burn area are regarded as being good. Several nice catches have been made recently in Erma Bell lakes but due to the warm water the fish are not in good condition.

All of the roads are in fair condition and are open to travel. West Boundary District: The lower section of the Willamette river is regarded as being the choicest section for fishing this time of the year and some nice catches are being reported from the vicinity of Lowell. Several limit catches have been made at the upper end of Big Fall creek but the fish are small and in poor condition. All of the roads are open to travel but they are dusty.

Santiam District: The Detroit and Cascadia districts report good fishing conditions. The North Santiam and Breitenbush rivers continue being good and Marion Forks and French creek are regarded as being fair. Lakes in the Detroit district which are the most popular at the present time and which are yielding limit catches consistently are Tumble, Elk, Twin, Marion, Duffy, John, Mowich, Santiam, Daly and Parish lakes. In the Cascadia area the South Santiam river is low and fish being caught there are quite small. The lakes in this section, however, are yielding limit catches and the most popular are Big lake and Clear lake. As in the south end of the forest, the Santiam district reports that flies with yellow bodies are the best lures.

All of the roads in this area are open to travel but they are rough and dusty. Cloudy weather during this past week has slightly lessened the fire danger but no rain has fallen on the forest. Every precaution should be taken, however, by everyone who enters the forest, to be careful of fire. Good citizens this time of the year are careful smokers. Do not jeopardize your public forest assets through cigarettes carelessly tossed along the highways or in the woods.

HIGHWAY GROUP THUMBS DOWN ON BRIDGE REQUEST

PORTLAND, Aug. 13.—(P)—The state highway commission cannot legally spend money to make a survey for a proposed bridge across the Columbia river near the Bonneville dam, members informed Samuel A. Lancaster who made the request at the meeting of the commission here yesterday. Lancaster said he desired the survey to obtain data to aid his work, as a private citizen, in seeking federal funds for the bridge.

The commission awarded contracts totaling more than \$500,000 on construction projects in nine counties. Bids on the Blouche section of the Hood River secondary highway were rejected as too high. The low bid of \$20,642 was tendered by the Parker-Schram company of Portland.

A delegation from Brookings, six miles north of the California line on the Coast highway offered to donate necessary right-of-way for widening the highway through the town, and obtained the promise of a survey to determine other costs involved. The commission denied a request of County Judge Hugh McLain of Coos to extend the Coos river secondary highway beyond Allegany. The commission considered an offer of \$6,500 toward construction of a bridge over the Coos river near Marshfield, action to depend upon the remaining cost.

SOIL CONSERVATION MEN ATTEND CLASS

Twenty-two supervisors appointed to check compliance on farms cooperating in the federal agricultural conservation program attended a school of instruction at the Four-H club building on the county fairgrounds Friday. The school was conducted by Arthur Lowe, in charge of the work throughout the state, and Clyde Walmer, his assistant, in charge of the

district in which Lane county is located, with O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, co-operating.

LEBANON LUMBER MILL MEN STRIKE

A strike that tied up the Wynn-Sewell mill operations in Lebanon was under way Friday, with union leaders charging that the management had unfairly discharged a union leader, C. A. Paddock, secretary, held that the company had recently signed an agreement to meet with the union's grievance committee before discharging an employee. He further charged that this was not done in the case this week and announced that a complaint would be placed with the national labor relations board. There is already one complaint against the company.

Officials of the company refused to comment on the situation, other than to confirm the report of a walk-out.

Goold to Assume Duties in Tacoma Starting Monday

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 13.—(U.P.)—Howard R. Goold, Eugene, Ore., appointed successor to Elmer L. Breckner as superintendent of Tacoma public schools, will officially assume his duties Monday, he informed school directors yesterday.

Goold, who sat in at the afternoon meeting, told the board his resignation as superintendent of schools in the university city had been accepted by directors at a recent meeting. He was granted permission to return to Eugene to assist in selection of an educator to take over his duties there.

One of Goold's first duties here will be selection of an assistant superintendent, a post which has been vacant for some time.

2000 OUT PICKING BEANS IN COUNTY

Bean picking is a big item in Lane county employment figures right now, about 2000 persons being out in the bean fields of this area at present. Packing of the green bean crop is

near the peak for the Eugene Fruit Growers' association with 250 tons being received daily at the Eugene and Junction City plants of the association. The heaviest delivery to date at the Eugene plant was 150 tons in one day. Peak of the season will come during the fore part of the week. Three crews are working on the bean crop at the local plant now for 24-hour operations daily.

For the first time in the history of the local plant a second crew has been put on for beans. The crop is coming in in heavy deliveries now.

Corn is just beginning to come and likely will be on in full swing at the plant next week. These three are the only crops coming in now, employing between 1400 and 1500 persons at the plant.

Shipping is also heavy now from the cannery, 35 carloads going out weekly. Many of the cars are straight while others are of mixed products.
