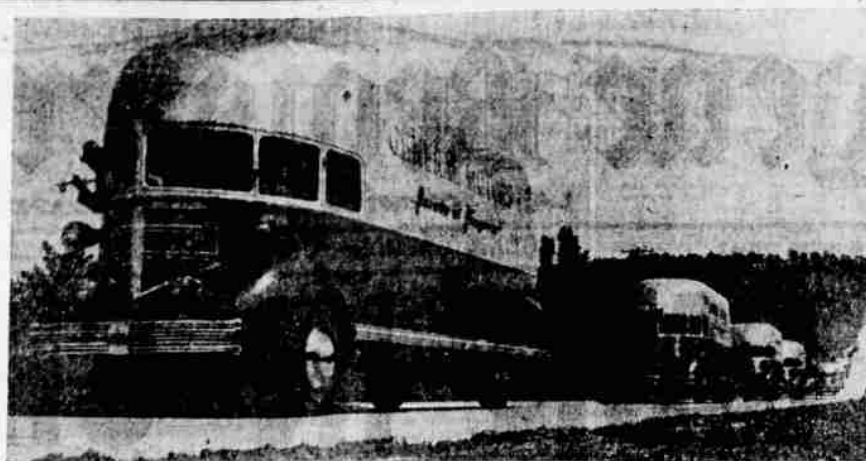

States to Get Money For Stream Pollution

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(AP)—The senate approved today legislation authorizing federal loans and grants to states for elimination of stream pollution. The measure would authorize the federal government to contribute one-third of the cost of labor and materials of any anti-pollution project. States, cities, individuals or companies would be eligible for allotments. In addition, it would permit appropriation of \$100,000 a year for expenditures by states for investigation and surveys and \$300,000 a year for administration by the public health service. The measure now goes back to the house for action on amendments.

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DOCTOR WINGS WAY TO SAVE PATIENT

KLAMATH FALLS, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Anti-venom rushed from the Rogue river valley in a plane piloted by her physician, Dr. Paul Sharp, probably saved the life of Mrs. Cyril Cook of Keno, attendants at the hospital where she is slowly recovering from a rattlesnake bite, said today.

Dr. Sharp, called to attend Mrs. Cook Saturday afternoon after she had been bitten near her home on the Klamath river, learned that the snakebite anti-toxin supply available here was only enough for one injection.

He telephoned a Medford druggist then hopped over the mountains in his cabin plane, picked up the packages of anti-venom, one of which had been hurried from Ashland to the Medford airport, and returned, all in the course of about an hour.

Mrs. Cook remained in a critical condition Saturday night and all day yesterday but appeared considerably improved today, Sharp said.
