

SEVERE 'QUAKE ROCKS MANILA

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refugees brimmed with tears of joy as the liner pulled into the port.

They had left a city of death behind and were greeted by the lively tunes of a United States army band and the blaring lights of Manila.

Customs House Hit
A score or more were still in the customs house when the very earth roared. The building swayed and cracked and the welcoming lights blinked out. Terror reigned.

Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt Jr. and her son, Quentin, had hurried ashore under the escort of President Manuel Quezon's personal bodyguard and were whisked away by automobile.

Seismologists said the quake was centered three and a half miles from Manila. They were unable to determine the direction of the epicenter because the recording instruments were knocked off their bases. Additional, but less severe, quakes were forecast.

New Ice Cream Store to Open

2 Districts Given Permission to Hold School This Year

Two Lane county school districts where the attendance of pupils is down to the minimum were granted permission by the county boundary board Friday to hold school this year and to collect the school fund annually due them. These districts are Camas Cwale and Sweets Creek.

Action on the petition of three other districts to hold school was postponed. No. 134, Pioneer, was requested to see if it could work out a plan of transportation with the Liberty district, adjoining, which will transport its pupils to Junction City. Silcoos district will be allowed to hold school if it is guaranteed that there will be six or more pupils in attendance. District will be asked to work out a transportation plan, if possible, with Wildwood.

No Band Concert Here Friday Night

The band will hold two rehearsals next week, one Monday night and one Thursday night, preparatory to the final concert of the summer season, to be given next Friday evening.

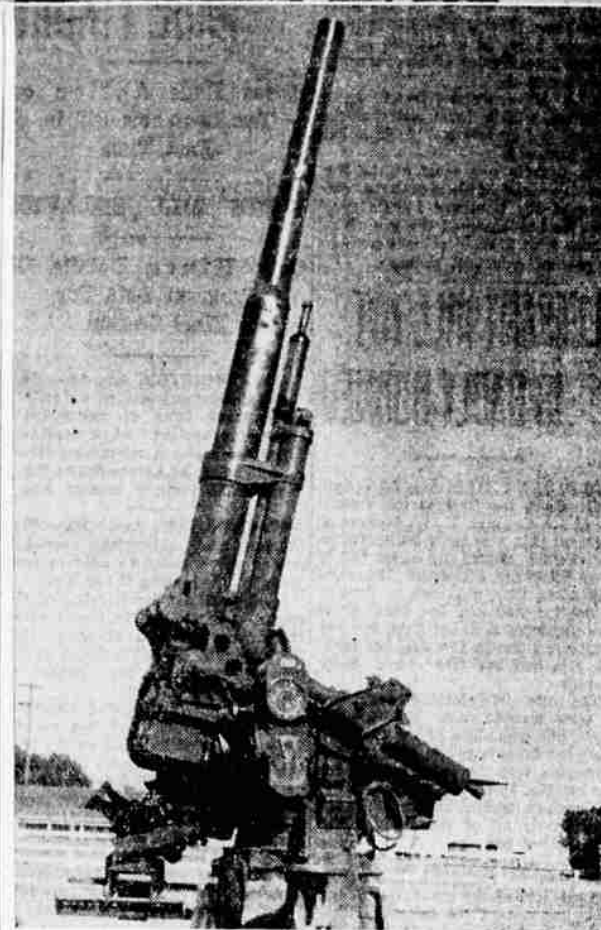
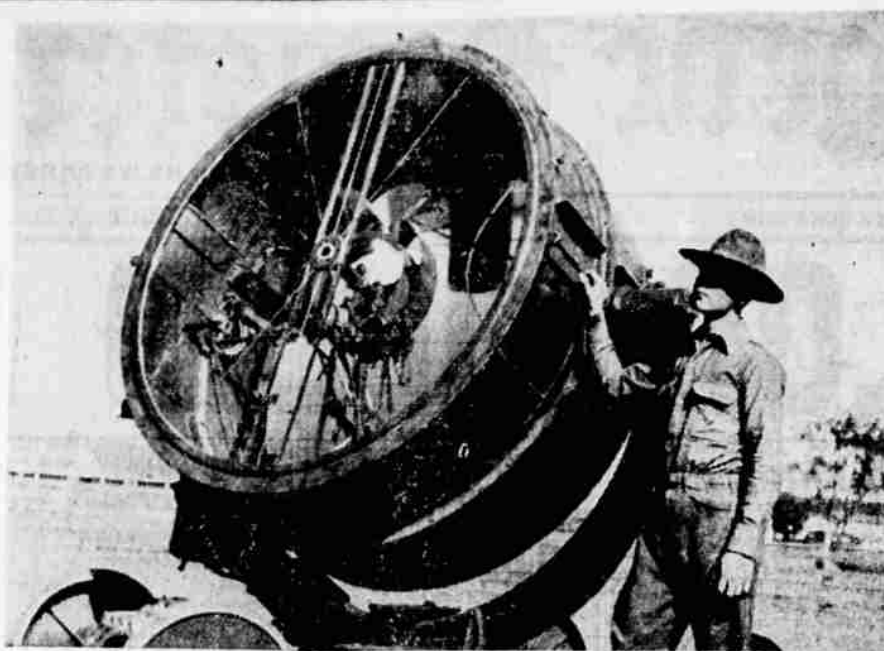

U. S. SAILOR DIES IN SHANGHAI WAR

wounded tonight when an anti-aircraft shell of Japanese origin struck the after well deck of the cruiser Augusta, flagship of the United States Asiatic fleet.

A fourth of Shanghai was ablaze as Chinese air forces struck savagely at Japanese properties along the Whangpoo river and Chinese artillery blasted at Japanese defense lines.

The Augusta, flagship of Admiral Harry E. Yarnell, fleet commander, has been lying in the Whangpoo river a little downstream from the heart of the international settlement, covering the evacuation of American refugees from stricken Shanghai.

The shell plunged from a high angle. Both Japanese and Chinese artillery and anti-aircraft batteries had been firing furiously through the late afternoon and into the night.

Refugees Leave
The Augusta stood by earlier today as two United States destroyers and a tender carried 1000 American refugees down the river to board the liner President Hoover for Manila.

Admiral Yarnell had told the Japanese navy that United States vessels would navigate the Whangpoo whenever and wherever he desired without reference to anyone. This was in reply to a Japanese request that American naval authorities give the Japanese advance notice whenever they wished to navigate the Whangpoo after dark.

American property suffered heavily as the battle for Shanghai, in its second week, became increasingly destructive of life and wealth.

The whole Pootung waterfront, teeming industrial area just across the river from the heart of Shanghai, was in flames, the result of heavy bombing of Japanese properties by Chinese planes.

Just Miss Cruiser
Three big cruiser shells, apparently from batteries in Chapel, northern Shanghai, nearly struck the Augusta

as she lay in the river a little downstream from the heart of the international settlement. Most of her crew of 800 took shelter below decks.

The sailor killed was Freddie John Falcourt of Raceland, Louisiana. None of the wounded was badly hurt.

The Shanghai International was rocked as if in an earthquake by the savage artillery duel over the Whangpoo. Chinese batteries well to the south of the settlement were exchanging shells with Japanese warships on the river and projectiles screamed over the foreign-held parts of the city.

Fourth Casualty
The sailor casualty was the fourth American to be killed in the eight days of war in Shanghai. Three United States citizens died last Saturday when misplaced Chinese air bombs wrecked buildings in the international area and killed more than a thousand persons.

Three Chinese planes roared over Pootung, across the Whangpoo from the French concession, and dropped eight bombs on Japanese-owned wharves, warehouses and cottonmills, which burst into flames.

Japanese pursuit ships raced toward the lumbering bombers. One of the Chinese planes caught fire from machine-gun bullets and crashed.

Chinese forces, attempting to drive the Japanese into the Whangpoo river, apparently held the Japanese along the river's banks in northeastern Shanghai. Chinese artillery repulsed a Japanese effort to land a flanking detachment at Luchow, 12 miles northwest of Shanghai.

Menace Consulates
Flames menaced the Soviet and Japanese consulates and the famous Astor House hotel.

Independent reports from the battle area said Chinese had not yielded an inch of their gains, and that the Chinese attack had split the Japanese lines.

Far to the north of Shanghai, Chinese armies, at least 100,000 strong, were reported to have launched a general offensive to wrest from Japanese invaders conquered areas of North China.

FRYING ON COLD STOVE EXPLAINED

The secret of frying eggs on a cold stove was revealed to members of the Eugene chamber of commerce Friday noon when L. E. Cowles, representative of the public relations department of General Motors, gave a short talk on the parade of progress to be shown here next week. Housed in modern stream-lined trucks, the exhibits and displays of the Parade of Progress are in reality a "world's fair on wheels," Mr. Cowles said. In describing some of the exhibits, he told those at the luncheon that at the exhibit they would see an egg fried on a cold stove.

As seen from the audience, the demonstrator places a newspaper on a small coil of wire, puts a frying pan on the paper, drops in an egg and in 30 seconds it is fried. As he lifts the pan from top of the "stove," indicating there is no heat there. The "trick" is performed through the use of an induction coil, through which runs an alternating current which magnetizes and demagnetizes the iron pan so rapidly that molecular friction is set up in the iron pan. This molecular friction is so fast that the pan becomes heated, frying the egg though the "stove" is cold.

Displays and exhibits are similar to many of the scientific marvels displayed at the world's fair in Chicago, Cowles explained. Preceding
