

MINER TOO TOUGH! REFUSES ALL HELP

PLACERVILLE, Calif., Aug. 20.—(AP)—Crushed under tons of rock, the body of Harry Achzig, gold miner, was found yesterday.

The rescuers said Achzig had apparently been instantly killed. His body was under 20 to 30 tons of rock and directly under one huge boulder weighing an estimated 15 tons. A second miner, Frank Libby, buried in the cave-in with Achzig, was dug out unharmed from the tumbled mass of dirt, rocks and debris, three hours after the accident. He immediately joined the rescue workers. The cave-in occurred near the portal of the tunnel of the Gopher-Boulder workings in the Mother Lode country, 13 miles west of Placerville, after a tractor passed over the shaft.

George Frazier, operator of a surface rock-crushing machine, was the first man to reach Libby. He heard the latter's shouts immediately after the cave-in, and scrambled 50 feet into the shaft to brush away dirt and allow Libby to breathe.

Libby said he had a feeling something was wrong just prior to the cave-in, and started to run. Achzig, he said, was deeper in the shaft. Rescuers found Libby's right leg twisted backward with the heel against his back. His arms were pinned outstretched. He was asked if he was hurt.

"Hell no, I'm all right," he said. He refused to lie down on an ambulance stretcher, saying he was covered with dirt and the stretcher sheets were clean. He said he wanted water. Somebody suggested whiskey. "Yeah!" Libby agreed.

He drained two small bottles of whiskey.

He danced around stiffly, slapped his chest and legs to restore circulation, and underwent an impromptu massage performed by Coroner A. J. Orrell and his assistants.

Then he went to work, digging for Achzig.

Achzig's home was in Sacramento.



PLANES READY TO START HUGE HUNT

Fairbanks, Alaska, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Missing a week, the Van-Tage transpolar flyers will be the object of one of the most widespread international aerial searches in Alaska-Artic history with arrival this week-end of Sir Hubert Wilkins, noted explorer, and a party of five in a 17-ton flying boat.

Sir Hubert and his pilot, Herbert Hollick-Kenyon, noted Canadian airman, arrived at Port Arthur, Ont., from Toronto, and planned to take off for Fort Smith N. W. T., 1,200 miles distant.

The huge silver flying boat, purchased by the Russian government for the expedition, will then fly north to join other aviators in the search for Sigmund Levanefsky, who, with five companions, was last heard from a week ago today, several hours before his four-motored plane was expected in Fairbanks to refuel for a United States dash.

Meanwhile, Jimmy Matern, rounded for three days by bad weather, continued preparations here today for an exhaustive search of the northern Alaska coast and beyond to the polar ice cap in his sleek, aluminum colored plane.

At Barrow, Alaska, a northernmost tip, pilot Bob Randall, veteran Canadian northland airman, planned to resume his quest for information concerning the lost flyers through interviews with scattered Eskimos in the sparsely populated Arctic area, from Barrow east to Herschel Island.

A. Vartanian, Soviet representative here, said last radio advice brought news Pilot Zerkoff, with navigator Padalko, arrived at Barrow late last night and were expected to continue their flight today to Akavik, N. W. T.

Vartanian also said he was informed the Russian ice breaker Krassin, carrying four Russian planes to be pressed into the search, was within 10 miles of Barrow late last night and was expected to cruise around there as contact point for the search planes.

CONGRESS RACES TO ADJOURN SOON

House laws as a means of preventing tax avoidance and evasion received final congressional approval and went to the White House for the president's signature.

Little Remains
So little was left to be done that veteran observers and legislators wondered why the leaders did not wind up the session tonight. There was a belief in some quarters that they might, although the regular program called for adjournment tomorrow night.

Not for many years has there been so little major legislation in the mill at a session's close. It happened this time only because most of the controversial problems were postponed until the next session.

House acceptance of a revamped sugar control bill sent the controversial legislation to the White House to an uncertain fate.

Ditched in the rush to adjourn were not only the wage-hour and farm bills, but a crop insurance measure and a host of less important bills.

May Salvage Bill
House leaders believed they might salvage from the wreckage a bill already passed by the senate for an unemployment census, and some senators were seeking a vote on a natural gas regulation measure which the house has approved.

Before quitting, house leaders also planned to approve a senate resolution making farm legislation the first order of business in the next session.

IRRIGATION HELD GREAT BENEFIT TO VALLEY FARMERS

More than 100 persons visited Lane county's leading irrigated farms on Thursday on the first day of the annual Willamette valley irrigation tour. They were told how vegetable crops in Lane county return as much as \$100 or \$200 an acre, of a cannery employing 1800 persons at the present time and of 3000 or more persons harvesting beans right now, nearly all as a result of irrigation.

A ton of beans grown from a pound of seed the irrigators were told by Truman Chase, who irrigates 40 acres of vegetables in the river bottom north of Eugene. They were told that because vegetables grown under irrigation are much more tender and crisp than those grown on dry land the Eugene Fruit Growers' association, operating the largest cannery in the northwest, refuses to take vegetables from unirrigated land. Sweet corn production is almost doubled by adding water during the growing season, it was pointed out. Instead of two and a half tons of sweet corn from dry land four and a half tons are grown under irrigation. In addition, 12½ tons of silage is produced.

Aside from the Truman Chase farm, points of interest visited by the irrigation party were the Thistledown farm on the highway north of Eugene, Ben Dorris' farm south of Springfield, Frank Bartholomew's farm north of Springfield and the Cloverleaf dairy northeast of Eugene, where water is taken from the ditch of the new irrigation system that extends through the McKenzie-Springfield area. Here pasture and forage crops are watered under a gravity system.

The members of the party had lunch at the Osburn hotel at noon. E. A. McCormack, manager of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association, told of the success of irrigation in Lane county as it applies to the raising of vegetables for the cannery.

Friday the party visited several farms in Washington county.

REVTMENT WORK IS PLANNED FOR

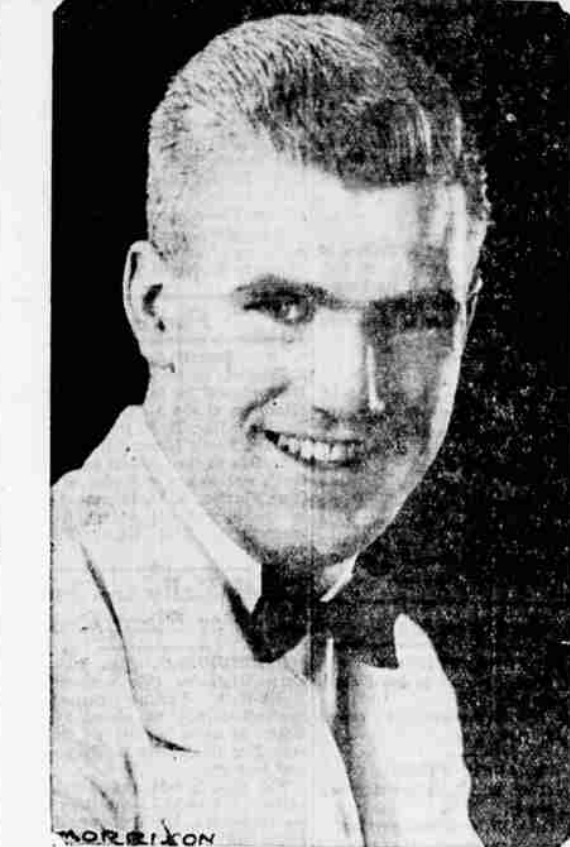
A county bridge over a slough at "Pumpkin Center," near the Lane county line north of Coburg will be strengthened so that trucks hauling rock from the Coburg bridge quarry to the Willamette river bank where a revetment will be built by the government at some future date will not break it down. County Commissioner Cal M. Young and County Bridge Foreman Art Striker, inspected the bridge Friday morning to ascertain the extent of strengthening work to be done.

The strengthening of this span is in anticipation of extensive work to be done on the river bank to prevent overflow of farming lands during freshets, but no word as to the beginning of construction has yet been received. Rock revetments will be placed on the river banks in the future instead of the gravel revetments built by the government two years ago and most of which were washed out when high water came.

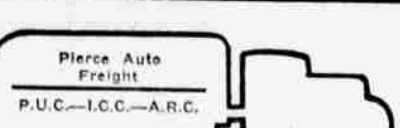
