Picturesque Cowboy
Outgrowth of Ideas
In Circus Display
"Trick riding, roping, and even the picturesque cowboy of the movies are not typical of the plains," says Ken Maynard, the screen celebrated Western star. "They are the outgrowth of the circus."

"Ten years ago, there was little roping among cow hands, and those who practiced it today received their inspiration largely from circus performers," he continued.

"As a matter of fact, the first trick roping in this country was done by a Mexican. He was a Mexican brought to the United States to join Buffalo Bill's Wild West."

"Women are responsible for the cowboy of today. They love the artistic and picturesque and when boys from the ranges began riding before the ladies, the feminine mind dressed him in tailored breeches, monogrammed silk shirts, muffers and the like. No real cow hand wears a rig like mine, he loves his overalls, open neck and wide-brimmed hat. The hat is the best friend the cow puncher has, and he spends a much time and money buying it as a woman does her Easter bonnet."

"Riding came naturally to me, just as talents of any kind are born in some of us. My first rodeo appearance was in 1918. A few years later I won the world's championship for roping and trick riding in Chicago."

"To be a good rider one must be born with love of it. I came from Mission, Texas, and spent all my summers on ranches around there learning all I could from cow hands. Soon their tricks were simple for me. Roping and roping are like any other profession. The thought constantly in mind 'What can I do to be different?' All depends on muscular development, nerve and practice."

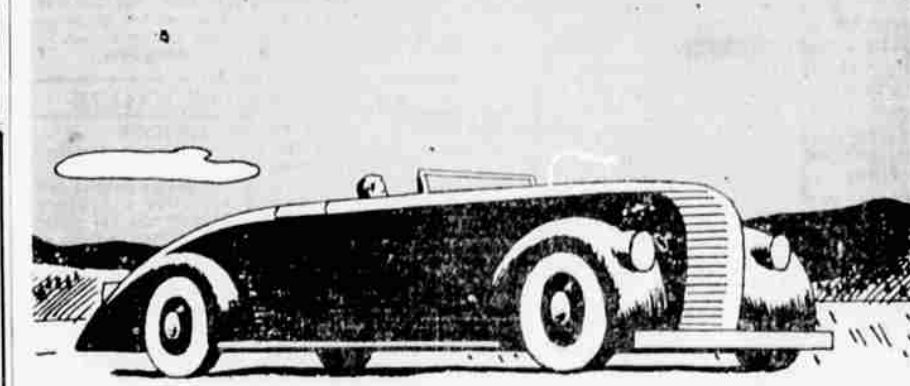
