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around the earth and gave employment to thousands. Banking, oil and aluminum were his principal interests and his corporate names were the Mellon National Bank of Pittsburgh, one of the nation's largest, the Gulf Oil company, and the Aluminum Company of America, dominant in its field. One of the last great statesmen-financiers of the nation, Andrew William Mellon successfully known the limelight and was little known to his countrymen until he became secretary of the treasury under President Warren G. Harding in 1921. He remained on the job until 1932 when he retired to become ambassador to Great Britain.

Fellow republicans hailed him as "the greatest secretary of the treasury since Alexander Hamilton," but he was the target of sharp attack by the democrats who unsuccessfully attempted to drive him from office in 1924.

Proud of Record

He was proud of his record as a cabinet officer and his party cited the reduction in the public debt from \$23,757,000,000 in 1921 to \$17,820,000,000 during his service. He met the criticism that the public debt had been reduced too rapidly with the statement that "far from hurting the country, it has been a great benefit to all those who needed capital."

FORD CHALLENGED IN LEWIS SPEECH

MILWAUKEE, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Chairman John L. Lewis of the C. I. O., flung down the gauntlet today to Henry Ford with a declaration the United Automobile Workers of America "are going to organize Ford workers."

Lewis told the delegates to the U. A. W. convention they had "work to do in the field, the work of bringing the right of self organization to the many thousands of workmen in the plants of Henry Ford."

The slaggish-browed C. I. O. chief-tain's challenge to Ford came at the close of his address and brought on a wild demonstration equaled only by the enthusiasm which marked his platform appearance.

Lewis told the convention that "despite every known form of opposition, the world knows the automobile workers in this country are free and will remain free."

These reports said the column hurriedly packed up and rolled out of the Basquean seaport which it helped occupy yesterday, leaving other brigades of Franco's 100,000-strong northern army to prosecute cleanup operations east and west of Santander.

Deny Chinese Charge

Japanese also denied a Chinese charge that Japanese machine guns poured death into civilian crowds along the wayside district of the riverfront. But today, the Shanghai municipal council had removed 200 bodies of Chinese civilians in that area.

While Japanese troops launched a supreme attempt to drive the Chinese army from the outer Shanghai defense lines, 120,000 of Nippon's fighting men hammered at 225,000 Chinese on fronts along strategic railroads in North China.
