

REPORT CARDS IN SCHOOLS PASSING

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Parents accustomed to threatening Johnny with a whipping if he doesn't bring home a perfect report card are due for a jolt this autumn.

Johnny may not get a report card.

Dr. Mary Dabney Davis, elementary education specialist at the office of education, said today many schools are replacing the periodic report card by conferences between teachers and parents.

Others, she said, use a new type card. It not only gives a more detailed report of the child's school activities, but also has blanks for parents to fill out, regarding the child's outside reading and other home activities.

She said the trend in modern report cards is to devote as much space to behavior as to subjects. Orderliness, cooperation and leadership are closely graded.

"The emphasis continues to be on individual rather than mass education," Doctor Davis said.

Several schools over the country, she said, will open this autumn without the traditional grade-a-year promotion system. Students will be promoted at the end of the third and sixth grades.

"Such experiments," Doctor Davis said, "illustrate efforts being made to make the school administration fit the children rather than the children the system."

Along curricular lines reports indicate a growing interest in social studies incorporating work in history, civics and geography. Small children will study industry, art, sources of food, types of production, housing, improved roads and improved plumbing as they investigate the heritage left by the past for their own generation.

LUMBER BUSINESS HURT BY SINO WAR

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—(AP)—The National Lumber Manufacturers association reported today that lumber production for the week ended August 21 was 20 per cent greater than new business booked and 19 per cent heavier than shipments.

The association said that 544 mills produced 269,416,000 feet of hardwoods and softwoods combined, shipped 226,727,000 and booked orders of 223,692,000. Revised figures for the preceding week were 565 mills, 286,372,000 feet production, 250,342,000 shipment and 230,513,000 orders.

Labor Tie-Up Looms In San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 31.—(AP)—A complete tie-up of the waterfront here was threatened today as the result of a CIO-AFL dispute. John P. McLaughlin, president of the teamster's union, an A. F. of L. affiliate, declared the union would stop handling goods tomorrow or next day unless favorable opposition of the warehousemen to teamsters' deliveries of California Packing corporation's products ceased.

CHINESE USE AXE TO HALT TRAITORS

SHANGHAI, Aug. 31.—(AP)—

Swift beheading was publicly prescribed—and demonstrated—by Chinese military authorities today for China's enemies among her own people.

These include such persons as traitors, spies, looters, incendiaries, rumor mongers and those who harbor traitors, poison water sources, secrete munitions or signal the Japanese enemy.

The public executioner, armed with a yard-long sword, put the order into effect yesterday in the Nantao quarter, lopping off the heads of two women and seven men.

The heads were promptly placed on picket fences as a terrible warning to others.

Scores to traitors have been beheaded or imprisoned, Chinese officials said, and others are being trailed in a counter-espionage campaign of nation-wide scope.

A central government spokesman declared the head of the most important organized spy ring was Huan Tsing, a secretary in the executive Yuan, one of the highest councils of the Nanking government. He has been beheaded.

Things's post, they said, gave him access to secret military information of great value to the Japanese. According to an official statement issued after his execution, Tsing was bribed by a Japanese official, described locally as a diplomat now in the United States.

A cafe head waiter was decapitated after being found guilty of employing sing-song girls to lure Chinese officials and commanders into disclosing secret information. Others were convicted of informing the Japanese of Chinese army movements in return for the privilege of looting captured towns.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 31.—(AP)—

Pacific Northwest national guardsmen, their two weeks of war at an end, left the swamps of Fort Lewis to the regulars today.

Their departure, beginning in earnest at 4 a. m., signaled the official end of the Fourth Army maneuvers held in the last month at San Luis Obispo, Cal., Fort Riley, Kans., Camp Ripley, Minn., and here.

Regular army troops from Fort Lawton, George Wright, and Missoula and Vancouver barracks remained in their tent cities, sodden under a blanket of rain but were to leave for their home posts Wednesday.

Oregon truck convoys began leaving the post here at 6 a. m. and were to arrive in Portland, Astoria, Tillamook, St. Helens and other home cities before nightfall. All were to arrive today.

The Eugene and Springfield contingents of the Oregon national guard arrived home on Tuesday morning from Camp Murray, Wash., where they had been taking part in the war maneuvers for two weeks. Company M, 187th infantry, Company C, 162nd infantry, and the medical detachment were the Eugene companies and Headquarters company from Springfield were on the special train that brought the troops back from the north.
