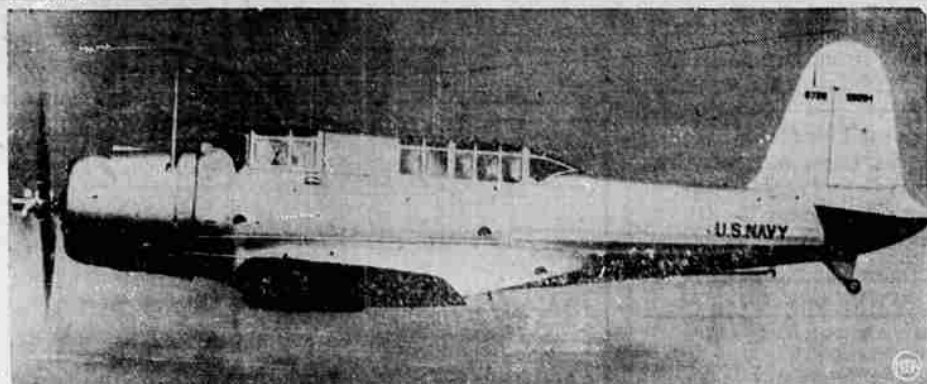

She carries a 1000-pound bomb and has a performance capacity higher than any existing service types, according to aeronautic engineers.

KEHRLI TO CONDUCT TESTS AT ASTORIA

Herman Kehrl, director of the bureau of municipal research and service of the University of Oregon, left Sunday for Astoria to conduct civil service qualifying examinations for firemen, as well as examinations for the purpose of setting up eligibility lists. Mr. Kehrl has been designated as chief examiner by the Astoria civil service commission.

Under the Astoria civil service plan, all present members of the fire department are required to pass qualifying examinations before being permanently included in civil service. These examinations are non-competitive, as contrasted with those for new recruits which are competitive examinations.

Since the adoption of civil service for firemen in a number of cities of the state under a 1935 legislative act, the bureau of municipal research and service has been designated as examining agency for several of the cities.

E. F. G. PLANT IS BUSY PLACE NOW

The Eugene Fruit Growers association plant continues a very busy place with canning operations on for beans, pears, peaches, corn, tomatoes, and blackberries.

Limited operations will be done this week on prune canning, although the crop will not be coming on freely until next week, since the fruit must be at the proper stage of ripeness to be accepted. The prune crop is short this year, about 25 per cent of normal.

Due to the relative higher prices for canned prunes, however, growers will receive a larger return for the canned fruit than for the dried prunes, and the big bulk of the Willamette valley prunes is expected to go into the cans this year.

Harvesting of the Lane filbert crop will be under way by the end of the month and the crop is a heavy one this year. Walnuts will not be coming on until October. They, too, show a good crop this year.

BOY SCOUT LEADERS CONFERENCE HELD

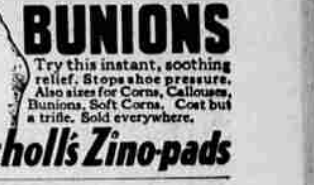
Thirty-four leaders from 20 Boy Scout troops attended the two-day training course held at Camp Lucky Boy over the week-end.

Alton F. Baker, president of the Willamette area council, welcomed the camp members, and commended their volunteer contribution to over 500 scouts in Lane county.

Russell Jones, Eugene, led a discussion on a planned program of scouting activities, listing the indications of good troop organization as proper use of the patrol system, a functioning committee, one assistant scoutmaster for every two patrols, an adequate out-of-door program, correct uniforms, balanced recruiting program, and a suitable meeting place and equipment.

Dr. A. E. Caswell, Eugene, spoke at church services on the topic of "The Scout Oath and the Law." The next meeting of troop leaders will be held at the scout cabin four miles south of Eugene, Oct. 9 and 10.
