

# HI-Y GROUP TO MEET ON MONDAY

For the purpose of completing organization, planning inter-club programs and setting the dates for a district Hi-Y and older boys' conference to be held in Eugene this fall, the newly organized Lane County Hi-Y council will hold their first meeting of the fall, Monday evening, September 27 at 7:30 in the University high school, it was announced Tuesday by W. P. Walter, general secretary of the local Y. M. C. A.

The Lane county Hi-Y council was organized in the spring at an all-day Hi-Y rally held in the city with the following as officers: Bob Deverill, University Hi-Y, president; Paul Cummings, Oakridge Hi-Y, vice-president; Daniel Martin, Eugene Hi-Y, secretary-treasurer. The president and faculty advisor of each Hi-Y club in the county compose the rest of the council. There are now five clubs in the county; one in each high school in the city, one in Creswell, Pleasant Hill and Oakridge. There have been requests from other high schools for Hi-Y organization and these will be taken care of as soon as possible, Mr. Walter stated.

Plans will be made at this meeting to bring more than one hundred selected older high school boys together for a two-day conference on high school problems and Hi-Y organization, the stated purpose of which is: "To create, maintain and extend throughout the school and community, high standards of Christian character." The name Hi-Y is a contraction of high school Y. M. C. A. Membership is open to older boys from the two upper classes in high school.
