

Record Bean Run Ends At Junction City Cannery; Carrots Coming Now

WORK EXPECTED TO LAST 6 WEEKS

JUNCTION CITY, Sept. 21.—(Special)—Junction City cannery started work on Monday morning employing a crew of about 45 men and women. They are expected to last for six weeks' run. The bean run that has just ended lasted for 31 days and 858 tons, 244 pounds of beans were canned making 65,895 cases. This is the longest run of beans this plant has ever used.
