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LIVESTOCK SHOW AT PORTLAND TO START SATURDAY

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Doors swing open at 8 a. m. tomorrow on the 27th annual Pacific International Livestock exposition here.

A ten per cent increase in premiums and a corresponding boost in arena prizes will result in the distribution of \$80,000 to farm and livestock exhibitors, \$25,000 to blue ribbon winners in the horse show and \$10,000 to rodeo participants.

A rodeo innovation this year will be the crowning of a king of the bucking horses, with a silver-mounted halter, suitably engraved, as a reward. T. B. Wilcox, exhibition president, said.

Robert Ormond Case and Ernest Haycox, widely known writers of western fiction, and Henry W. Collins, veteran president of the Pendleton round-up will judge rodeo performances.

A free matinee performance of the horse show and rodeo will feature the children's day program, beginning at 1:45 p. m., during which all children of school age will be allowed to see the entire exposition for a small gate charge, Wilcox said.

Matinee and night shows are also scheduled for Sunday.

The morning's program will include intercollegiate judging in the animal husbandry, dairy husbandry and dairy products sections and Smith-Hughes vocational judging. Judging has been scheduled for all day in the land products, wool and mohair divisions.

Lists of exhibitors in livestock and industrial departments far exceed those of the 1936 exposition. O. M. Plummer, general manager, said.

Man Injured When Tractor Overtakes Dies in Hospital

Eugene's first traffic death of 1937 was recorded Friday evening when Charles Johnston, 19, route 2, Eugene, died in Sacred Heart hospital, of injuries received Sunday when a tractor he was driving rolled over on him. Young Johnston's death is the only one caused by vehicular mishaps so far this year within the city limits.

The month of September saw auto accidents in Eugene take a big jump, city police officials reported Friday. In the 30 days which ended at midnight Thursday 124 crashes occurred within the city limits, with 11 injuries being reported. The figures indicated a jump from those of the preceding month.

In the nine month period starting January 1, 1937, and ending Thursday, 908 traffic crashes have been recorded in Eugene, with 102 injured.

Truck Cases, Civil Suit in J. P. Court

Alvin Clifford Stockstad was assessed costs in the justice court Friday for speeding a truck on the highway and Arthur Wayne Skidgel was fined \$5 and costs for having no P. U. C. license for his truck.

A civil case entitled Dennis Lucas against Vernon and Mildred Hutson, in which a replevin action was started on account of the alleged impounding of some livestock by the defendant tried before Justice of the Peace John Bryson Friday. The jury awarded the defendant \$10 damages and awarded two calves to the plaintiff. It was alleged that plaintiff's stock went upon the defendant's land and the latter impounded them for damages.

"I say this without fear up here," he said. "In the south there would be too many 'wolves' hanging on my trail." His final words on Saturday's Oregon-Stanford game were that it should be a very close, exciting game. "And don't be too critical," he added as a parting shot.

Oregon's Prink Callison expressed his opinion on the coming encounter, saying Stanford looked "pretty strong" when he viewed them last week. He expressed regrets for Capt. Tony Amato who was unable to attend the luncheon. Amato is in Portland under a specialist's care for a severely cut eye, suffered in the UCLA-Oregon game last week.

Roy E. Morse, retiring chairman of the board, was given a vote of thanks for his conduct of the business of the advisory group during the past year.

Dr. Richmond, home service fund treasurer, made his annual report to the board, showing a larger income for Salvation Army work than at any time during the past six years, all local bills paid with the exception of \$12 for relief. A balance of \$10 remains in the 1936-37 fund.

Major C. Ford, in charge of the Eugene and Lane county activities of the Salvation Army, was called upon to make the annual report to the board of work done during the past year, covering relief and character-building activities of the organization. The report received the commendation and approval of the advisory board.

The report revealed that 21 Lane county girls had been received into the Salvation Army's White Shield Home for unmarried mothers, they and the 14 babies born to date having received a total of 3,150 days care at a cost to the institution of \$2,840, only \$894 having been received from Eugene district, relatives, the state, and other sources; making the cost to the institution \$1,946.76.

Rain Nearly Ends Danger of Forest Fires in County

Perry A. Thompson, superintendent of the Willamette national forest, announced Friday that the heavy rains of Thursday afternoon and evening had almost ended forest fire hazard for the 1937 season.

"Several slashing burns which were put out by the torrential rain before they were completed," Mr. Thompson said, "Now we'll have to wait for the slash to dry before we can complete fall burnings."

Lane county CCC groups which were sent to Curry county to aid in fighting the big Siskiyou national forest blaze earlier in the week arrived back at their home camps during the night, it was further announced. Rains also extinguished that fire.

Group Inspects Site Of Polio Sanitarium

Inspection of the proposed site of the Oregon Warm Springs foundation polio myelitis hospital at McCredie Springs was made Thursday afternoon by Harry Devereaux, engineer, John Durr, chamber of commerce secretary, and Emil Martin, proprietor of McCredie Springs resort.

The site, according to Mr. Durr, is just east of the present hotel at the hot springs. A preliminary survey of the site was made Thursday, with Mr. Devereaux scheduled to return early next week to make complete checks on water supply and the possibility of hydro-electric development to assure adequate electricity for the proposed sanitarium.

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GRADE CROSSING ON HIGHWAY OUT

J. M. Devers, Oregon State Highway department official, notified the Eugene chamber of commerce Friday that a proposed grade crossing plan over the nearly completed Willamette Pass highway had been abandoned.

The grade crossing plan, proposed by the Gilchrist Lumber company, Ltd., of Klamath Falls, aroused a storm of protest by backers of the new fast route to south and eastern Oregon and California points when it was broached about a month ago.

A hearing was held by the State Highway commission at Klamath Falls, at which time the lumber firm argued the highway would never be of more than secondary importance and therefore a grade crossing would be of no injury to its usefulness. Proponents of the highway argued that the highway would be the main artery between Willamette valley and rich Klamath and Lake county areas.

Overhead Plan Adopted
Action of the lumber company in voluntarily abandoning the grade crossing idea in favor of an overhead railroad crossing happily ends all argument on the question.
