Roosevelt One Of Three Great "Ameddican" Presidents Claims Famed English Political Writer

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—(P)—A man in a long black cloak and a dark crush hat has come 4,000 miles to mount the steps of the White House and tell President Roosevelt what he thinks England thinks of him.

"His hat is the style of '69. His nose is long and thin. But his strongest hold is a sad, sad smile. That whippers of grief within." Hannen Swaffer is sad. That isn't why he wears a long black cloak and dark crush hat—a fun-brious figure as well known in England as George Bernard Shaw. He's sad about the president. He wants to tell Mr. Roosevelt that whatever darkling thoughts some American critics may have about him, Englishmen—at least, my crowd," he interpolated—think F. D. R. is—

"Tops?" suggested a reporter. "Quite!" said Hannen Swaffer. The 56-year-old London political pundit and dean of British dramatic critics, who likes to think of himself as "the last Englishman left in the world," continued:

"I want to tell the president what we think of him in England—that you Americans" (he pronounced it "Ameddicans" in the best Mayfair tradition) "have only had three great presidents, Wash-

ington, Lincoln and Franklin Delano Roosevelt. All equally great. "Why Roosevelt?" said Hannen Swaffer, who is going home to write about F. D. R. for 10,000,000 British readers. "I shall tell you. Because in four years he has had to implement 40 years of British social legislation. So great was the need and so terrible the crisis that he has made mistakes, but his mistakes have been much better than any of the previous republican triumphs."

A man with a load of curiosity is Hannen Swaffer. Besides the president, he wants to see—and tell his readers, he said:

1. What's wrong with United States prisons "because we can't understand all these riots."

2. John L. Lewis "because next to Mr. Roosevelt we regard him as America's most dynamic figure. . . and because, you see, I as a socialist understand all these labor troubles."

3. What has become of New York's famous "four hundred?" That worries him. "We never," said Swaffer, "hear about them any more. Has it really been discovered as the hokey it always was?"

4. A typical mid-west town "because I don't believe such a thing exists."

5. Mayor Fiorello H. La Guardia of New York "because he is re-

building a great city not in terms of skyscrapers but in terms of human life and living."

"And last but not least," he said, "I want to see the 'nine old men' in Washington."

"As an Englishman, I feel you people worship your constitution much more than we worship God. You don't understand that at the time it was written it was the most idealistic document ever penned by the hand of man. But that was a long time ago."

"Today the United States has developed its manhood but is still wearing the swaddling-clothes of a constitution meant for intellectual children. You go on worshipping this dead thing."

HOUSING OFFICIAL HAS SUGGESTIONS FOR LAND BUYING

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A general trend throughout the United States of increased rentals substantiates the statements in the Federal Housing Administration's annual report that the country is in need of an enlarged program of residential building.

More than one-half of the non-farm families live in rented quarters, according to the 1930 Census. From the evidence of increased rentals one may judge that living units are at a premium, as a large number of such rental properties

on the market would tend to lower rents rather than raise them.

According to an index prepared by the National Industrial Conference Board giving rental figures paid by wage earners, July 1937 shows 87.1 per cent, as compared with 78.1 per cent for July 1937. This index uses the monthly average for 1923 as equal to 100 and shows July 1934 at 64.7 per cent and July 1935 at 70.5 per cent.

For 1937 the index records a steady increase, with 82.2 per cent for January, 82.8 per cent for February, 84.2 per cent for March, 85.2 per cent for April, 86.1 per cent for May, and 86.6 per cent for June.

From other sources it would appear that rents on single-family dwellings have risen more rapidly than apartment rents.

In a discussion of rent increases, Clarke G. Dalley, president of the Real Estate Board of New York, Inc., pointed out that a succession of gradual increases would oper-

ate to stimulate building, entirely to provide new space need for it became apparent that low rents would age building, resulting in age that would skyrocket high levels.
