

ONE CELEBRATES 25TH ANNIVERSARY

Eggmann's was founded Oct. 1, 1912, by Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Eggmann in the building now housing the chapel and in 1914 the store was moved to its present location, Fourth and Main streets.

Since that time, Eggmann's has handled a large assortment of candy and fountain drinks, and as a side-line business, the wholesaling and retailing of Eggmann's cough-drops. Since Mr. Eggmann's death a few years ago, Mrs. Eggmann has managed the store.

As a special feature of the birthday anniversary, the store is giving a bag of candy to each child 12 years old or younger who registers with Mrs. Eggmann.

Cream of Corn Soup

2 cups chopped corn 1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 cup water 3 tablespoons butter
2 slices onion 3 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon sugar 1 1/2 cups Borden's Evaporated Milk
