English Yacht Is Safe in Port Again

GOSPORT, England, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The America's cup yacht Endeavor I, back from the grave, arrived home in triumph today.

Nineteen days ago she left Newport, R. I., in tow of the motor yacht Viva II. Next day she broke her steel tow line in a storm that roused immediate fear for her. Search was made for her for days. On Monday the British tanker Cheyenne sighted her 260 miles off the southwest tip of Ireland, and flashed the news that she was safe.

Cargoes to Japan and the Atlantic seaboard recorded the biggest slump, more marked at the Columbia river than other shipping points. Total shipments were 387,000,000 board feet, compared with 454,000,000 in June.
