

POTATO PRODUCERS FAVOR REGULATION OF CROP HANDLING

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—(AP)—The agricultural adjustment administration announced today that preliminary referendum returns indicated that more than three-fourths of the potato producers in three commercial late potato producing areas favor marketing agreements and orders to regulate the handling of the crop.

Producers in the fourth area rejected the proposals. The referendum, held from Sept. 13 to 25, showed the largest majority in favor of the program in the north central area. Ninety-two per cent of voting producers in Idaho, Wisconsin, Minnesota and the Red River valley of North Dakota favored the program.

Producers in an area, which included part of Maine, voted 56 per cent against the program.

About 80 per cent of producers voting in Colorado, Nebraska and Wyoming and 69 per cent in the Idaho area supported the program.

AAA officials pointed out that with more than two-thirds of the producers in the three north central and western areas favoring the program, orders could be issued making the program binding upon all handlers of potatoes grown in those districts but that an order could not be issued in Maine because of the adverse vote.

The program is designed to promote orderly marketing, boost consumption of the large crop of commercial late potatoes, and peg prices.

AAA officials said that 13,992 votes were cast. Meanwhile, they called a meeting with representatives of growers and handlers in Chicago this week to consider further problems concerning the marketing agreements.

Big Program Planned To Aid Valley Scheme

A letter from R. H. Kipp, executive secretary of the Willamette valley advisory board, in charge of work on the proposed Willamette valley project, notified the local chamber of commerce Tuesday of a large and important forum meeting in Portland Nov. 8. The forum, sponsored by the Portland chamber of commerce, will be to publicize the proposed project.

The Eugene chamber has been asked to secure a prominent speaker to represent the upper valley at the luncheon, which will be extensively broadcast over the radio.

High Court Starts Consideration of Petitions Tuesday

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—(AP)—The supreme court began today its secret consideration of more than 400 petitions, including two challenges to the right of Associate Justice Hugo L. Black to remain on the bench.

The conferences, held in a close-guarded room at the rear of the court chamber, will continue on Thursday and Saturday.

Observers expect the justices to announce next Monday whether they will consent to pass on questions raised as to the eligibility of their new colleague, who took his seat yesterday.

His challengers—neither of whom mentioned the controversy over Black's onetime Ku Klux Klan membership—are Albert Levitt, former federal judge in the Virgin Islands, and Patrick Henry Kelly, Irish-born Boston attorney.

They contend Black's appointment was unconstitutional because he voted for the bill giving retired justices full pay for life.

It was generally assumed that Black would not participate in consideration of the petitions affecting him.

Oakridge Man Hurt, Car, Engine Collide

Injured when the car he was driving was struck by a Southern Pacific engine near Oakridge Tuesday morning, Julius Anderson, 48, who resides near Oakridge, is in the Eugene hospital suffering from a broken pelvis.

According to reports, the engine was coming down the mountain and struck Mr. Anderson's car as it was crossing the track. He was taken to Oakridge on the engine, and brought to Eugene by ambulance.

Bridge Picketed By Trades Council

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 5.—(AP)—Motorists who are sensitive about passing a "picket line" will have to avoid US highway No. 99 W. south of McMinnville for a time.

"Without a declaration of war," the president said, "and without warning or justification of any kind, civilians, including women and children, are being ruthlessly murdered with bombs from the air."

"In times of so-called peace, ships are being attacked and sunk by submarines without cause or notice."
