PROPERTY BIDS AT GROVE ARE LISTED

Coop property for sale and purchase of lots 3, 4, 5, Georgetown addition, was carried. Several other properties were ordered sold including the Proudford property at South Sixth and Harrison.

BUSY SESSION OF COUNCIL REPORTED

REEDSPORT, Oct. 6.—(Special)—The regular monthly meeting of the city council of the City of ReedSPORT was held Monday evening. No action was taken on the matter of pinball license ordinance, as the legality of the machines is still in question, several cases being now in court in various counties, including Douglas county.

Captain Hebert, inspector for CCC camps in this area, with Captain Seddon, commander of ReedSPORT camp, attended the meeting with a view of getting the question of water rates for the camp settled. The council had, during the latter part of September, instructed the water commissioner to install a meter at the camp, there having been considerable correspondence between the area headquarters at Vancouver, and the city, during the last three years, concerning water rentals at the ReedSPORT camp. The decision of the council, subject to its approval by the Vancouver office, was that the city would execute a contract for a year, at \$30 per month, and that in the event of cancellation of the contract, or material reduction in personnel at the camp, the present meter rate would apply.

The matter of sale of the city ambulance was discussed. This ambulance was purchased by the local post of the Legion and by the volunteer fire department, and turned over to the city. The Legion has requested that in the event of sale of the ambulance, the Legion's portion of the proceeds be applied toward the construction of some sort of community building.

Councilmen Dunn, Borrevik and Coreoran were appointed to secure estimates for the construction of a city jail and to devise ways and means for financing the same.

The street committee was instructed to investigate the matter of excessive speed by cars in the vicinity of the ReedSPORT schools, with a view to erecting "School" or speed limit signs.
