Third Inning Yankees
The irrepressible Yankees showed across two more runs, running their lead to 3-0. DiMaggio led off by flying to Chiozza and Gehrig lined a single off the right field wall but ran to second when Ripple tried to catch him at first. Dickey smashed a triple, scoring Gehrig and Selkirk singled on the first pitch, scoring Dickey. Melton began warming up for the Giants. Hoag sacrificed and Lazzari was passed intentionally. Pearson fanned on a called third strike with the count three and two.

Two runs, three hits, no errors, two left.

Third Inning Giants
Danning popped to Lazzari. Whitehead fouled to Gehrig and Schumacher was called out on strikes with the count two and two.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Fourth Inning Yankees
Keeping up their bombardment of Schumacher, the Yankees nudged over another run, giving them a 4-0 lead. Crosetti was thrown out on a bouncer to Ott and Rolfe lined a hit to right, making it good for two bases when Ripple threw wide to second. DiMaggio beat out an infield single to Ott, Rolfe taking third. Gehrig flied to Moore and Rolfe scored standing up. DiMaggio holding first. Dickey forced DiMaggio, Whitehead to Bartell.

One run, two hits, no errors, one left.

Fourth Inning Giants
For the fourth straight inning, the Giants went down in order. Moore went out when, with the count three and two, he hit a hard smash to Crosetti, who made a nice stop. Bartell rolled out to Crosetti and Ott fanned swinging.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Fifth Inning Yankees
Schumacher gave up another run and the score was 5-0. McCarthy added to the Giant collapse by fumbling Selkirk's roller and the Yankee fielder ran to second on a belated throw to Schumacher which went wild. It was a double error for McCarthy. Hoag singled

on the first pitch, scoring Selkirk. Chiozza fumbled the hit and was charged with an error which permitted Selkirk to score. Lazzari fanned, swinging, with the count two and two and Danning threw to McCarthy to catch Hoag but the throw was wild and the first baseman had to fall down to get it. Pearson bounced out and Crosetti flied to Moore.

Fifth Inning Giants

Seventh Inning Yankees
Cliff Melton, who was knocked out of the box yesterday, went in for Schumacher. Selkirk flied to Ripple on the first pitch. Melton stopped Hoag's hard smash but threw wildly past McCarthy and Hoag ran to second on the error. Lazzari was passed intentionally and Pearson grounded into a double play, Whitehead to Bartell to McCarthy.

No runs, no hits, one error, one left.

Seventh Inning Giants
The National leaguers finally broke Pearson's charm and scored a run, making the game 5-1 for the Yankees. Ott flied to Lazzari on the first pitch. Ripple made up for some of his raggedness by singling between Gehrig and Lazzari and McCarthy piled a double off the left field wall, scoring Ripple as Hoag juggled the rebound. Chiozza bounced out and Danning was thrown out by Crosetti.

One run, two hits, no errors, one left.

Eighth Inning Yankees
Chiozza took Crosetti's line drive and Rolfe walked on four straight

balls. DiMaggio flied to Ripple and Gehrig followed suit.

Bartell led off by lining to DiMaggio on the first pitch but Ott got a single to left. McCarthy walked on four straight balls and after Pearson threw three straight balls to Chiozza, the Yankees called a conference. The next was a ball and Chiozza filled the bases. LABOR DELEGATE SUGGESTS REPEAL OF WAGNER LAW

DENVER, Oct. 8.—(AP)—American Federation of Labor convention delegates mildly applauded a suggestion Wednesday that the federal might well advocate repeal of the Wagner labor disputes act.

Joseph Padway, Milwaukee labor lawyer, made the suggestion with two strings attached.

The law that William Green once called "labor's magna charta" should be repealed, he said, if the labor relations board attempted to freeze craft unions out of mass production industries and if Congress refused to amend the act to protect craft unions.

Despite the statement of Chairman J. Warren Madden that the labor board was strictly impartial in the AFL-CIO fight, criticism of the board continued at convention sessions.

After Padway spoke, C. A. Weaver of Des Moines, Iowa, member of the musicians' union, asked Green whether the convention was justified in believing the labor board was "created for the purpose of promoting the CIO."

"Well, not originally," Green replied. "It was created to make men free."

Arthur J. Altmeyer, chairman of the Social Security board, told the convention that the federation's demand for broadening the social security program would be met eventually without question.

The program as it stood, Altmeyer said, was "neither unchangeable nor perfect" but had "met urgent present needs."

Livestock Price Declines Likely To Affect Meat

CHICAGO, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Forecasting possible meat price declines, livestock quotations Tuesday slumped to the lowest levels in weeks.

Consumer resistance to high meat prices was an important trade factor at the stockyards.

The market for steers, which recently sold at the highest prices in 18 years, virtually was at a standstill after Monday's sharp break of 50 cents to \$1.50 a hundredweight. Commission merchant refused lower bids in an effort to halt the decline.

Hogs prices dropped 50 to 65 cents a hundred, one of the sharpest declines in months. The top price of hogs fell to \$11.50, compared with an 11 year top of \$13.75 paid in August.

The drop in livestock already has been reflected in sharp price concessions on some wholesale meat cuts. Livestock men said price fluctuations in wholesale meat usually are reflected at retail counters sooner or later.

They said the sluggish condition of the wholesale meat trade in recent weeks has had a cumulative depressing effect in the live market. Passive consumer resistance in many of the major distributing centers has been a weight on livestock prices but the organized strike in New York Kosher shops

practically shut off for the time being demand of shipping interests who buy cattle for the eastern trade. This, coupled with a good sized week run, was largely responsible for the break in cattle yesterday, trade authorities said.
