SPRINGFIELD COUNCIL ACCEPTS CONTRACT

SPRINGFIELD, Oct. 12.—(Special)—At a meeting of the Springfield city council held Monday night, an ordinance was passed accepting a five-year contract between the city and the Mountain States Power company for street lighting.

The contract dated to July 1, 1937, when a previous contract expired. Under the terms of the contract, the city will be given lower rates on street lighting and at the end of each year during which the contract has been in effect, the city will own one-fifth of the ornamental street lighting system.

Also specified in the agreement was that the city could terminate the contract at the end of any year providing that 60 days' notice was given.

Accompanying the contract, was a letter from the power company declaring that three per cent of the gross earnings based upon the electricity sold to the inhabitants of Springfield as well as the city, would be paid in monthly allotments "as long as the council takes no official action against the company," either to attack the rate basis or an alleged power franchise.

The city recorder was instructed to write a letter to James D. Ross, newly appointed administrator for Bonneville dam, declaring Springfield's interest in securing power from the dam.

The council passed a condemnation ordinance condemning dilapidated and unsafe buildings. Another ordinance was passed declaring the council's intention to construct a sewer through block 7 in the Brattain addition T. J. McCracken, W. A. Taylor and Alex Stevens were appointed viewers.

It was voted to call \$1000 general fund warrants and \$1000 bonds. The resignation of S. A. Waldrup as street commissioner was accepted and Thomas Le Mond was appointed to take the position temporarily.

The council accepted a deed from Paul Hadley turning over to the city the alley through block 7, Brattain addition, and also a portion of a street between blocks 6 and 7 in the addition.

AFL SAYS BOARD FAVORS CIO GROUP

the typographical union, charged today that the A. F. of L. was acting "with complete desperation" in its war against the rival Committee for Industrial Organization.

Howard, who is secretary of the C. I. O., assailed the A. F. of L. convention for voting the executive council power to expel the ten rebel unions and for attempting to destroy the possibility of political or governmental support for John L. Lewis. "So far as the action of the

federation is concerned in regard to the C. I. O., it will make no difference whatever in our program," Howard said.

HILLMAN REPORTS
ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Sidney Hillman, chairman of the Textile Workers Organizing Committee, a C. I. O. affiliate, reported today that his group unionized one third of the nation's 1,300,000 textile employees in a six months drive that cost \$970,000.

He told delegates at secret C. I. O. conferences here that the T. W. O. C. expected to double its membership within the next 12 months and that everything would be done to avoid strikes "whenever possible."

Hillman's report followed that of Philip Murray, head of the Steel Workers Organizing Committee yesterday on the C. I. O. drive in that industry and a financial statement showing that the steel drive and the strike in "little steel" this summer cost the C. I. O. \$860,000.

LANE IS PILING CENTER OF WORLD

mates. Lineal feet of piling shipped from this area during a year totals 9,000,000 feet.

The Wall Street Journal article, in describing Eugene as the piling center of the world, pointed out that only in this area can piling of 100-foot lengths be found. Only Douglas fir will grow to the desired length and slimmness and the trees found in this region are rated as the best piling in the world, the article declares. According to the story, 1800 cars of piling are being shipped from the state of Oregon each month.

Piling up to 130 feet have been obtained here, while the average is from 75 to 90 feet in length. Outside of Oregon, piling rarely can be found longer than 65 feet, it is said.

Much of the piling produced here is shipped to New York for use in the world fair construction work there. A great deal goes to the Missouri river area for the flood control project and more goes to North Carolina, Massachusetts, California and Texas.

CARBON USE SAID NEEDED IN WATER

bles do appear in the future, immediate investigation to determine the cause should be made.

Examination for bacteria was made by Dr. Levin and Mr. Everts when in Springfield, and samples of the water were collected at the intake, at the reservoir, at the water plant and at eight points in widely separate parts of the distribution system.

"A high bacterial count and B. coli were found at the intake," the report states. "The bacterial counts in all other samples were uniformly low. As in previous samples recently examined from the Springfield water supply, fermentation was present in a majority of the tubes inoculated."

"Exhaustive tests showed the fermentation to be caused not by B. coli, but by the presence of certain bacteria living in the water." The report further pointed out that although this point may be of interest scientifically, it has no sanitary significance and further emphasizes the importance of carrying the bacteriological examination to completion.

Listed as "probable causes of taste" in the water supply, were: The uncontrolled plant growth in the vicinity of the intake, creosoted wood pipe installed when the water supply intake was extended about one mile above the old intake and above the flax retting plant, and failure to flush the water mains periodically.

Referring to "algae" or the plant growth prevalent in such places, the report said that destruction of these plants will impart a taste to the water if chlorine dosages are not carefully controlled. A microscopic examination of the water revealed that these organisms were not present, therefore cannot be considered.

"The combination of creosol compounds from the pipe line, with chlorine will cause a distinctly unpleasant taste, but is not harmful; it may cause nausea in some persons, the report brought out.

The papers said the chlorinator and filter were functioning satisfactorily during the investigation.
