

AFL VOTES BOYCOTT ON JAP GOODS

EMPLOYEES OF EUGENE GIVEN PAY INCREASE

Budget For 1938 Calls For Levy Of \$244,451.66; Same As 1937

FOR RELIEF FUND

Third Pay Scale Raise Adopted By Committee; Arguments Few

Eugene's tax levy for 1938 will be the same as it was for 1937—\$244,451.66.

Employees of the city will receive pay raises at one-third scale.

These two actions were highlights of the third meeting of the city budget committee meeting held at the city hall Tuesday night.

Motion Adopted

P. J. Hanns, member of the city council, made the motion to adopt the levy, and with but a few questions from department members, the motion was put to vote and passed.

Following adoption of the wage scale, the committee acted to reduce the emergency fund estimate that the 1938 levy would be \$244,451.66. It was thus reduced to \$244,451.66.

The meeting opened with consideration of relief funds to be raised by various charitable organizations for aid to transients during the coming year. \$3500 was allocated.

4 MEN INDICTED BY GRAND JURY

Four indictments accusing that many men of larceny and burglary were returned by the Lane county grand jury Wednesday forenoon.

One indictment was against Granville White and Earl Cox, charged with larceny in the shop and warehouse of the national forest service on First avenue west on the night of Sept. 22. Not a true bill was returned in the case of William Berryhill, accused of the same offense at the same place. A second indictment was against Joseph Kimman, accused of burglary in a dwelling. Douglas Karpensky was indicted on a burglary charge.

The grand jury took up other cases after reporting on these four indictments and indications pointed Wednesday to an early consideration of the murder case against Frank Radich, Cottage Grove lumber hand, who fatally shot Harry Hansen, farm hand working on the Bryson Sears farm east of Cottage Grove last Friday night at the Woodson auto camp.

Karpensky, Kimman and White were arraigned Wednesday afternoon and Judge Skipworth will allow them to enter their pleas on Thursday at 9:30 a. m.

University Accepts National Broadcast

FLAX GROWERS TO SIGN FOR SUBSIDY

Short Wave To Carry Nov. 26 Program To Other Lands

Direct from Eugene to all parts of the United States and to many foreign countries, the University of Oregon will broadcast on Friday, November 26, the day after Thanksgiving from 6 to 6:30 p. m., the Pontiac hour on the NBC Blue network to which several short-wave stations will be attached.

President C. V. Boyer wired acceptance today and requested Rex Underwood, director of the University Symphony to take charge of preparing the program. Mr. Underwood called into consultation John Landsbury, dean of the music school, John H. Stehn, band director; Barney Hall, president of the ASUO; and Gayle Buchanan, women's president.

The selection of the University of Oregon for this broadcast is one of the first results of last year's four broadcasts by the Symphony and indicates that University and Eugene talent will be in demand frequently for important network use.

"The University is certainly to be congratulated," said Chancellor F. M. Hunter, "and I am sure this show will be a revelation to the thousands of people who will hear it."

"This is a marvelous opportunity," said Dr. Boyer, "and we shall surely make the best of it."

Dean Landsbury and Mr. Underwood declared:

"A variety of talent will be used in this broadcast with the orchestra and band and chorus furnishing major numbers. One humorous speaker will be present."

EUGENE EYES POSSIBILITIES IN BONNEVILLE

Power To Handle Peak Load In City May Be Purchased

RESERVE NEEDED HERE

McArthur To Confer With New Administrator On Power Plans

The possibility of hooking onto Bonneville's power lines when and if they are built to this section will be investigated by J. W. McArthur, superintendent of the Eugene public utilities, he announced Wednesday.

Superintendent McArthur plans to confer with J. D. Ross, recently named administrator of Bonneville, as soon as the interview can be arranged. In their discussions, Mr. McArthur will determine the plans for distribution of Bonneville power and if transmission lines are to be built to this part of the country, Eugene in all probability will be a customer for a certain amount of Bonneville power—providing the rate is right.

Use Near Capacity

Electric users in Eugene are at present taking almost capacity power from the electric utility, McArthur said. The system can now deliver approximately 9100 kilowatts to the city and recently one day's load was slightly over 8000 kws. This means that during

COPS TO PROTECT WORKERS AT PLANT

PORTLAND, Oct. 13.—(AP)—An announcement that AFL employees of the Plylock Corporation plant would return to their jobs tomorrow morning followed a declaration by Mayor Joseph K. Carson that "police will allow no assemblage of menacing mobs."

The plant closed Monday when AFL officials said employees were threatened with "bodily harm" by some 400 CIO sympathizers who gathered at its gates.

The mayor instructed Chief of Police Harry Niles to seek the assistance of state police if necessary to maintain order.

A hearing on charges of Wagner act violation, brought by the National Labor Relations board against three northwest lumber companies and the Industrial Employees' Union, Inc., scheduled for Monday, was postponed until next Monday by E. J. Eagen, acting regional director for the labor board.

Lumberman Faces Contempt Charge

Roy Swenson, lumberman of the Lake creek valley, Wednesday was directed by Judge G. F. Skipworth of the circuit court to appear before him Thursday at 9:30 a. m. to show cause why he should not be punished for contempt of court.

The order was made because Swenson allegedly disobeyed an order of the court, made September 25, by falling trees across a logging road operated by Julius P. Hult, Nils Hult and Carroll Hult to the canyon from the Blachly Horton road and paralleling Lake creek.

An injunction order had been obtained by the Hults against Swenson restraining him from interfering with traffic on this road.

Department Store Thieves Get \$100

Thieves Tuesday night ransacked the Metropolitan store on Willamette street, escaping with about \$100 in cash.

City police were investigating the robbery Wednesday, and reported the belief the culprits had hidden in the store before doors were locked for the night, then rifled all the cash registers of what sums they held. The robbery was believed to have occurred sometime between 6 and 10 o'clock. No clues were left other than an open window in the rear of the store.

ITALY CALLS FOR 50,000 MORE MEN

U. S. Will Attempt To Bring About Agreement

Italian blackshirt leaders today asked for 50,000 volunteer militiamen to meet "emergencies" as the British cabinet decided to call the international "hands-off Spain" committee into session this week.

Fascist officials in Rome denied that any of the volunteers were intended for Spanish service, but the British and French governments were known to be disturbed by recurring reports of further Italian intervention.

In Spain fierce fighting continued, especially on the northern front where the insurgents reported advances in their drive on Gijon. Insurgent and government sources reported more than 30 warplanes were brought down in a series of Columbus day sky battles.

Germany announced a non-aggression agreement with Belgium. British officials would not admit it, but it was known that the new Belgian foreign policy which scrapped the old defensive alliance with Britain and France had caused uneasiness in London.

CHINESE HOLDING SHANGHAI, Oct. 13.—(AP)—A Chinese spokesman declared today that Japanese forces had lost more than 3,000 dead and wounded in a disastrous attempt to crash the Chinese lines across Wentao creek into Tazang, four miles northwest of the international settlement.

FARLEY BANQUET TICKETS GO FAST

The banquet will be held at the Osburn hotel, starting promptly at 6 o'clock Saturday.

Mr. Luckey announced that a delegation of several prominent Eugene people would go to Salem Saturday afternoon to meet Mr. Farley and conduct him to Eugene. He will inspect the new postoffice site here then go direct to the banquet.

A public address will be given by the postmaster general at 8 o'clock Saturday evening at the armory, with possibility that the address will be broadcast over the facilities of the Mutual broadcasting system.

An informal reception will be held by Mr. Farley following the address at the armory. His party will leave for San Francisco at 9:10 p. m.

Representatives of Eugene grocery stores will hold a private meeting Wednesday night for the purpose of deciding on matters of policy, it was announced by Percy Edwards, official of the group. Whether or not the gathering will discuss the current union situation was not revealed.

Pickets still continued to parade in front of both Ralph and Stanley stores Wednesday, but officials of the firm intimated they were having more success getting deliveries of grocery supplies. Meat markets and vegetable stands at both stores are not affected by the union stand.

Thursday night Retail Clerks' association will hold a meeting to discuss unionization in grocery stores.

There were no new developments in the A. F. L. lumber boycott situation Wednesday, union headquarters reported.

Enrollment at U. O. Reaches New Peak

A new enrollment record at the University of Oregon was reached Tuesday when registration figures revealed that 3,102 students were enrolled. The figure exceeds the previous record high enrollment of 3,095 by seven.

The announcement of the new record was made by Clifford L. Constance, assistant registrar. "The previous high mark was reached in the fall of the school year 1930-31," Mr. Constance reported.

WILL JOIN MOVEMENT IN BRITAIN

Convention Unanimously In Favor Of Proposed Program

CONDEMN AGGRESSION

Recommends Other Unions Of Nation Join In Movement

DENVER, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The American Federation of Labor convention voted unanimously today to join British labor in a boycott on Japanese goods.

Along with the British-American boycott, the resolutions committee report recommended that AFL officers seek its extension by requesting the cooperation of trade union movements elsewhere.

"Your committee is keenly aware of the heavy burden of responsibility resting upon the government of the United States and the governments of many nations in Europe as a result of the unwarranted and brutal aggressions in the east and in other portions of the world as well," the report said.

Hits Aggression

"We are of the opinion that these governments striving so earnestly today to prevent a world conflagration, may have their humane purpose and their efforts to keep the conflagration from spreading, increased by the action of justly indignant citizens of the country in declaring for action against aggressor nations."

"Your committee is unwilling to recommend any action by this convention which would add to the heavy and critical responsibility of the department of state at this time."

Cost Of Children Is Being Neglected In Wage Fashions

The plight of "Poor Paw" was the topic of the Round Table (town and gown discussion club) at its first meeting of the season Tuesday night and Dr. E. J. Moore, sociologist, started the jousting with a paper exposing how the cost of children is neglected in prevailing wage fashions.

In France, Belgium and some other European countries (where children are a necessary patriotic crop) the family man is recognized with a definite increase in his pay every time a child arrives. France requires employers to do this and payments are made out of industrial pools for the purpose.

In this country, according to Dr. Moore, we are still struggling clumsily to find "a living wage" based on the "average family" of father, mother and three children, but the failure is reflected in falling birth rates, an increasing number of childless homes and a growing army of bachelors, and increasing burdens of those who do accept the biological urge or social duty of contributing to posterity.

Unless the situation is remedied, it can have very bad effects on our industrial and social prosperity. Statisticians are generally agreed that three children per couple are necessary to perpetuate the race, but there seems to be
