

STANLEY FIGHTING TRUCKER BOYCOTT

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the union by saying: "I don't care if my employees join the union or not. I just refuse to have a union agreement governing my stores."

Ed Riley, president of the Retail Clerks Protective association local here, was asked if Ralph and Stanley employees had been asked to join his group. "We asked employees of the two Ralph and Stanley stores to join our group some time ago, before the present trouble arose. Some of those asked signified willingness to join our union, others did not."

Union officials had no statement to make Thursday other than to announce that all warehouse and trucking employees of the A. F. L. in this area had been notified that Ralph and Stanley stores are on the "unfair" list. The action makes it impossible for Stanley to get deliveries by truck from either Portland or Eugene, unless he uses his own carriers. Trouble would then arise in getting warehousemen to handle the grocery supplies.

Some trouble arose Wednesday afternoon when two trucks from the company went to the McCracken Bros. warehouse to pick

up several consignments for the two stores. Union employees of the trucking firm were called out on strike by Hugh Reynolds, secretary of the teamsters here, but soon went back to work when Chief of Police Carl Bergman arranged a truce between the two groups.

The Stanley employees on the trucks were allowed to remove all goods consigned to the firm stored in the warehouse, but union men announced no more goods would be brought here from Portland or other points by truck.

Situation at Impasse
Thursday afternoon the situation was still at an impasse, with both groups determined to pursue present courses. Mr. Stanley said he might try and truck his own goods from Portland, but stated he had made no plans on this line as yet. Only possibility of the firm getting outside supplies lies in the railroad, which does not recognize the picket line. Difficulty would be experienced there also, it was stated, as warehousemen perform loading and unloading operations in freight cars.

The grocery store-retail clerks situation was partially cleared up Wednesday night when representatives of many grocery firms in this area met to discuss unionization problems, and made plans to draw up counter proposals on wages and hours in answer to recent union demands.

The Retail Clerks' Protective association will hold a meeting on Thursday night at the labor temple to discuss their side of the organizing question. Ed Riley, chairman of the group, said no definite action has been planned.

Deere Case Laid Over For Few Days

The hearing of Dick Deere who had been cited to appear in circuit court Thursday morning to show cause why he should not be sentenced on a charge of concealing stolen property, was continued Thursday until Monday, after some testimony had been taken. It was thought best that the defendant should have an attorney and Howard M. Brownell was appointed by the court. Deere had been on probation and it was alleged he had violated the terms laid down by Judge Skipworth.

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capitating him to the ground. He was injured and was walking with a limp when arrested. He then climbed over the fence surrounding the jail.

The break occurred about 3:45 o'clock, according to Jailer McIntyre, but it was not discovered until after 4 o'clock when Howard Brownell, appointed by the court to defend Kinman, went to the jail to consult him.

The theft of a car belonging to Ray Hurlburt of Yoncalla was Kinman's undoing. After he had spent some time in the "jungle" near the S. P. terminals Kinman came back to Eugene and took Hurlburt's car standing in front of the Oregon hotel. He had given a boy some money to buy a bottle of wine and after consuming a portion of it, started out on the highway north. The car collided with a pole near the Cabin City auto camp at the north city limits and Kinman started afoot across a field. Ray Bernie, proprietor of the camp, gave chase, bringing him back to the camp office. This was about 9:30 o'clock. Officers were told over the telephone that a drunken driver was being held and when Sheriff Swartz and a state police officer arrived they found it was the man they had been scouring the city and surrounding country for since 4 o'clock.

Records show that Kinman, alias Martin Benson, alias William Anderson, has served two penitentiary terms on larceny and holdup charges and that he has been in numerous county jails on different charges. He is only 23 years old. All county prisoners except two or three trustees have been kept in the cell block since the escape and an effort is being made to learn the identity of those who helped Kinman reach the window. It is believed that two or three men formed a "pyramid" in assisting him to climb through the window.
