

Florence Olson, Lumber Boat, Wrecked Off Coast In Reedsport Area

MISHAP OCCURS ON JETTY ROCKS

REEDSPORT, Oct. 20.—(Special).—The S. S. Florence Olson, outward bound from the Umpqua river to San Francisco, via Coos bay, with cargo of lumber from Reedsport, received damage to her rudder, starboard propeller shaft and thrust block from collision with the north jetty just inside the Umpqua bar, Monday noon, and now lies at anchor in Winchester bay, awaiting survey by marine insurance adjusters.

Port Pilot Joe Butler, with Captain John Lind, master of the Florence Olson, had crossed over the bar in the morning with the pilot tug Tiger, having taken soundings and had found the bar smooth enough at that time, but just before noon when almost to the bar, Capt. Lind decided the bar had become too rough for passage and ordered the ship to return. In backing up, the vessel gained considerable sternway, and in turning, her stern hit the rocks of the jetty.

The Florence Olson will probably be tained several days, and may possibly have to be towed to San Francisco for repairs, in the event that drydocking of the ship should be necessary.

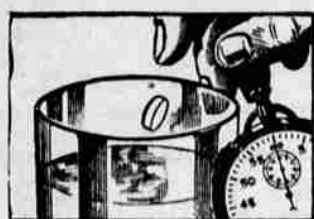
