NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—(AP)—A late rally in the rails stiffened a wavering stock market today as rumors reached through and direct market active to shippers and wholesale houses, steady-strong; good-choice 170-210 lb. drivings 97-85, carload lots quotable 10.00, better, 23-25, 2.02; packing sows largely 8.00, light-weights up to 8.25; feeder pigs scarce, quotable up to 9.75.

Cattle, 150, including 12 direct calves, 50, including 31 direct market slow, mostly steady; few common steers 2.75-4.75, load good 1.17 lb. weights 9.23, sorted 1 head at 7.23; common heifers 6.00-6.00, cutters down 4.00; low cutter and cutter cows 2.50-2.50, common-medium and good beef 5.25-5.00; bulls 5.00-2.50, good beef up to 5.75, cutters down 4.23; few good vealers 2.50-2.50, choice quotable 6.50.

Sheep, 3000, including 2450 through and direct, market very slow, scattered sales steady-weak; few good fat lambs 2.25, strictly choice kinds held over 9.00, common around 7.00, few yearling wethers 6.00-5.00, 2-year-olds 5.00; good slaughter ewes 3.50, culls and common 1.25-2.00.

Sheep 10,000; fat lambs slow; opening 25 and more lower; early sales native downward from 10.00; few choice lots 10.25-33; choice yearlings 9.00; nothing done on range lambs; little on slaughter sheep; indications about steady on feeders.

NEW CROP OF NUTS AT PUBLIC MARKET

New crop walnuts are appearing in the public market and are selling at 30 cents a pound. This is a little lower than usual, but higher quality bring a better price.

Some Bartlett pears are still in the market and were selling at five cents a pound Thursday.

There is yet a limited supply of green corn selling at 15 to 20 cents a dozen and late Crawford peaches are found to be selling at 15 to 25 cents a basket.

Mince meat is on the market at 20 cents a pint or 35 cents a quart.

GRAIN PRICES DROP ON CHICAGO MARKET

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Wheat late today suffered 1 1/2 cents a bushel overnight setback following New York stock market reactions and a letup of export demand for North American wheat. A feature of wheat trade was selling of May contracts here against purchases at Winnipeg. Active milling demand for wheat here was much in evidence on price declines.

At the close, wheat was unchanged to 1/2 lower compared with yesterday's finish. Dec. 20 1/2-1/2, May 20 1/2-1/2, corn 1 1/2 up, Dec. 50-50 1/2, May 51 1/2-1/2, and oats unchanged to 1/2 cent advance.
