

BUDGETEERS CHOP HEALTH REQUESTS

plan for a sanitary engineer, the association told the committee it would appropriate \$300 toward the health officer's salary increase. The county pays half the total amount, \$1800.

In the budget of the home demonstration agent, the committee lopped off \$50 for clerical hire, \$50 for travel, \$20 for material and office expenses and \$30 for equipment. The committee allowed \$1,000, same as last year, for these items.

The committee pared \$60.88 from the requested budget for the fair board, allowing \$900. This amount is in addition to a request for an appropriation of \$5,450 which the board is asking to permit the staging of a fair here next year. That portion of the fair board budget has not yet been considered.

In considering the budget for the fairgrounds, the committee received a report showing 99,904 persons had attended various functions held at the fairgrounds during the past year. This total included an estimated 30,000 at the pioneer pageant and 30,000 for the General Motors parade of progress.

Working through most of the smaller items of the budget, the committee gave unofficial approval

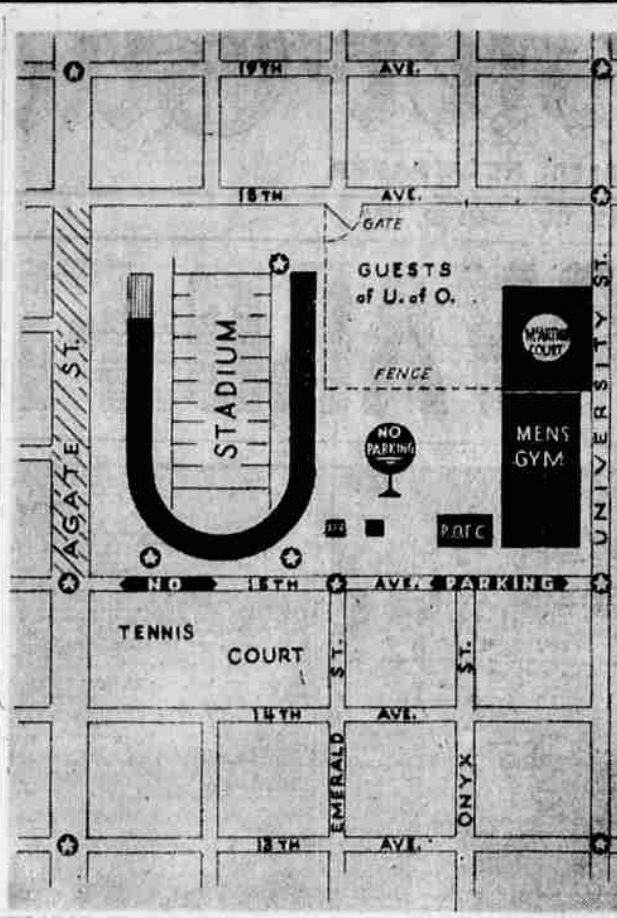
al to several requests Friday morning and there remained only the county departments to be considered. Items so far passed, are still subject to final consideration in case the committee wishes to make further revisions.

The following items were unofficially approved Friday: County agent, \$2,000; coroner, \$1,000; home demonstration agent, \$1,000; justice courts, \$2,500; juvenile court, \$2,660; thistle control, \$2,500; U. S. labor service, \$780, a reduction from \$1,296 last year made possible through governmental assistance; unemployment relief, \$8,000; fair board, \$900.

The above map, prepared in cooperation with Chief of Police Carl Bergman, shows streets where cars may be parked, where traffic officers are to be stationed, and routes cars will be asked to use after the game is over. No parking will be allowed in the fields nearby Hayward field. Cars parked on Agate street will all be headed towards Nineteenth avenue, which they will be required to use when leaving the game. Parking will be the same as usual on other streets. Cars parked heading north and west will be asked to use University, Agate and Thirteenth streets in leaving the game. Cars parked heading south or east, will use University, Agate and Nineteenth streets when leaving.

DOCTOR REPORTS ELIXIR TRAGEDY

MT. OLIVE, Miss., Oct. 22.—(AP)—Dr. A. S. Calhoun, Covington county health officer and veteran physician of this rural community, said six patients for whom he innocently prescribed a new elixir had died, but that six others had shown no ill effects.

Dr. Calhoun reported the deaths last night after his friend, the Rev. J. E. Byrd of Mt. Olive, died yesterday at Knoxville, Tenn. The physician said the six living patients have "shown no ill effects. But they are like people facing a death sentence; nobody knows what tomorrow may bring."

He said he began prescribing an elixir of sulfanilamide for some patients after "a representative of one of the leading drug houses interested me in the elixir preparation for the drug."

James W. Mott Will Address Forum Meet

Congressman James W. Mott will be guest speaker at the chamber of commerce luncheon scheduled for next Wednesday noon, it was announced by John Durr, chamber secretary. Mr. Mott will address a joint assembly of chamber of commerce and Lions club members, and will forecast on pending legislation in the special session of congress recently called by President Roosevelt.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Oct. 22.—(AP)—Bids were called today for construction of a new Riverside school building to replace the one destroyed by fire last February. Architect's cost estimates totaled \$74,500. Bids will be opened Nov. 12.

SALEM, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Governor Charles H. Martin voiced vigorous opposition to "socialized" medicine and extolled the "intangible serv-

ice" the family doctor renders his patients last night in an impromptu address at the Oregon State Medical society convention here. "When you attempt to regiment medicine, it destroys the professional spirit. It will create a political machine that will lead men to look only for the fees they can earn," the governor asserted.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Tom Blackman of Klamath Falls, Ore., won No. 10 rating today in high school livestock judging at the 10th annual convention of the Future Farmers of America. Elmer Juntunen of Newberg was third in dairy cattle judging. Orvall Cummings, Elwood Dull and Bill Powell, all of Corvallis, placed fifth among milk judging teams. Cummings was the fourth highest individual.

SALEM, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Condemnation proceedings will be started against the remaining property owners on the new state library site unless the three owners come to terms. T. H. Banfield, member of the capitol reconstruction commission, said today.

SALEM, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Salem's new mountain water, which will flow into the city's mains a week from tomorrow, will be 10 degrees colder than the present Willamette river supply, which is 68 degrees, engineers said today.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 22.—(AP)—The first purely local radio hook-up in southern Oregon will link Klamath Falls, Medford, Marsh-

field, and Roseburg stations for a play-by-play description of the Oregon-Oregon State football game at Eugene, J. B. Toles, manager of KRNR, Roseburg, announced today. KRNR will originate the program, with Marshall Pengra, its commercial manager, as sportscaster.

PORTLAND, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Henry Corbett, president of the Port of Portland, said today current WPA funds for construction of the new super-airport near Col-

umbia slough will be exhausted Nov. 2, when work must cease. No new funds are in sight. The \$1,420,000 has been spent on the project, and a request for an additional \$1,850,000 for completion of the work was sent to Washington last spring. Corbett said the project was "sold" to Portland by the WPA and that the port had proved a \$300,000 bond loan for the purpose of the site was completed.
