OREGON'S VICTORY BELL SAFE AGAIN

men were searching for the victory bell. A pell-mell rush toward the mill race resulted. Staters were forcibly pulled from "cornered" automobiles and the mill race "cooled" the ardor of well over 200 Beaver fans before the two-hour "battle" ended.

Downtown business men, many of whom are Oregon alumni, were "ticked pink" over the spirit shown by University students in their "defense" of the bell, and the general outcome of the melee. Former athletic stars, who have but recently bemoaned the lack of "Oregon spirit" recalled times in the early days of the University's history when similar outbreaks had occurred. One Eugene doctor and prominent alumnus recalled the November day in 1910 when Oregon's Ducks whipped the Beavers so badly at Corvallis that a mob fight immediately broke out with such ferocity that even President Campbell of Oregon was knocked down in the scuffle. The 1910 riot caused athletic relations between the two "sister" institutions to be broken off for one year.

More recent alumni recalled the November day in 1931 when Paul John Schisler's Beavers were supposed to whip Doc Spears' Webfoots, but were held to a scoreless tie. Following that epic encounter, Oregon Staters painted the big "O" on Skinner butte—scene of

much violence Monday—and were caught in the act.

Campus leaders reported Tuesday afternoon, with Gerlinger hall the scene of "action". Student body officials reported Oregon's Webfoots would have more united support in future games than "ever before in the history of the institution."

Meanwhile, more and more funny stories about occurrences in the big melee Monday were being heard. Tales of a Stater who was forced to stay in the mill race ten minutes because he lost all his clothes as he hit the water—of another who walked the downtown streets looking for a ride to Corvallis clad in nothing more than shorts and shirt—of the Oregon law students who deserted classes to shower water-filled toy balloons on unsuspecting students in the big caravan continued to be chief topics both on the campus and in downtown Eugene.

And the Victory Bell, whose projected "bellnapping" caused the entire battle, was safe and sound at "home" again!

WAR ON BUILDING COSTS IS LAUNCHED

A nation-wide counter-attack by the building industries against the charges of high building costs has been launched, officials of the West Coast Lumbermen's association stated Tuesday. Maintaining that the rise in the cost of home ownership since the record low year of 1932 has been far less than that of income values as represented by industrial wage earnings and farm prices, the association declares that the home-buyer gets more for his money today than in 1932. Attention was also called, in regard to comparisons between 1937 and 1929, to the fact that the home of today is as superior in living services and facilities to the 1929 home as a late-model car is to the automobile of the twenties.

As its part of the campaign to educate the prospective homeowner in the real values of today's home, the association is preparing for publication a study of cost comparisons between 1937 and 1932 homes. The association has also joined with other organizations of the building industries in contributing to the special "Truth About Building Costs" issue of the American Builder. This issue is just off the press. In it every phase of the home-cost question is covered. Articles, graphs, and pictures present evidence to demonstrate that the market for homes must continue to rise; that 1937 homes have more real values than 1929-1932 homes; that a far smaller portion of the building dollar is required for financing costs of the 1937 home than of the 1929 home; that today's home represents less bushels of wheat, hundredweight of hogs, etc., than the same home would have cost in 1932; that the design, materials and equipment of today's home are beyond comparison.

ed the recess, and indicated that the C. I. O.'s proposals had caused a sensation in the committee meeting.

"You can't expect them to come out of a dead faint and keep right on negotiating," he said. He was asked how George M. Harrison, federation chairman, reacted to the C. I. O. plan. "He's still quivering," Curran said.

Demand Autonomy
The C. I. O. peace committee of 10 men offered to lead the 3,700,000 workers they represent back into the federation, with the provision that existing C. I. O. unions retain their autonomy under a new and distinct department of the A. F. of L., and be permitted to continue the principle of industrial organization.

The offer constituted the first concrete program to end the two-year civil war within the ranks of organized labor.

The C. I. O. proposed, as a condition to peace, that all existing C. I. O. affiliated unions be grouped in a new department in the A. F. of L.; that they be allowed to

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and that all chambers of commerce in the county and all service clubs participate in the preparation of material for the publication.

The budget was practically completed at the forenoon session and odds and ends were expected to be completed at the afternoon session. County Clerk Dillard, whose budget was cut originally from \$22,725 to \$21,000, appeared at this meeting and asked for an additional item of \$1204 for a book-keeping machine. This request was to be acted upon later in the day.

Budget Trimmed
The sheriff's budget was fixed at \$29,704 as compared with \$33,120 handed in by that official.

The committee finally adopted the road budget of \$352,387.74. The levy for the general road fund will be two mills divided as follows: Bridges, \$30,000; emergency, \$15,000; right of way, \$10,000; purchase of materials and equipment \$27,500; total \$82,500.

There will also be two mills for the nine districts including eight cities, amounting to \$82,500 and two mills for market roads amounting to \$82,500. The total levy will thus be \$247,500. Anticipated income will include \$19,887.74 from forest rentals; \$70,000 from the O. and C. fund and \$15,000 from state highway funds, making a total of \$104,887.74. This added to the total levy of \$247,500 makes the grand total for roads of \$352,387.74.

A comparison with expenditures for roads in other years was given by the committee as follows: 1933, \$185,426.62; 1934, \$221,241.22; 1935, \$210,587.99; 1936, \$266,709.19; 1937, \$226,338.57 to Oct. 1, \$53,002.88 balance.
