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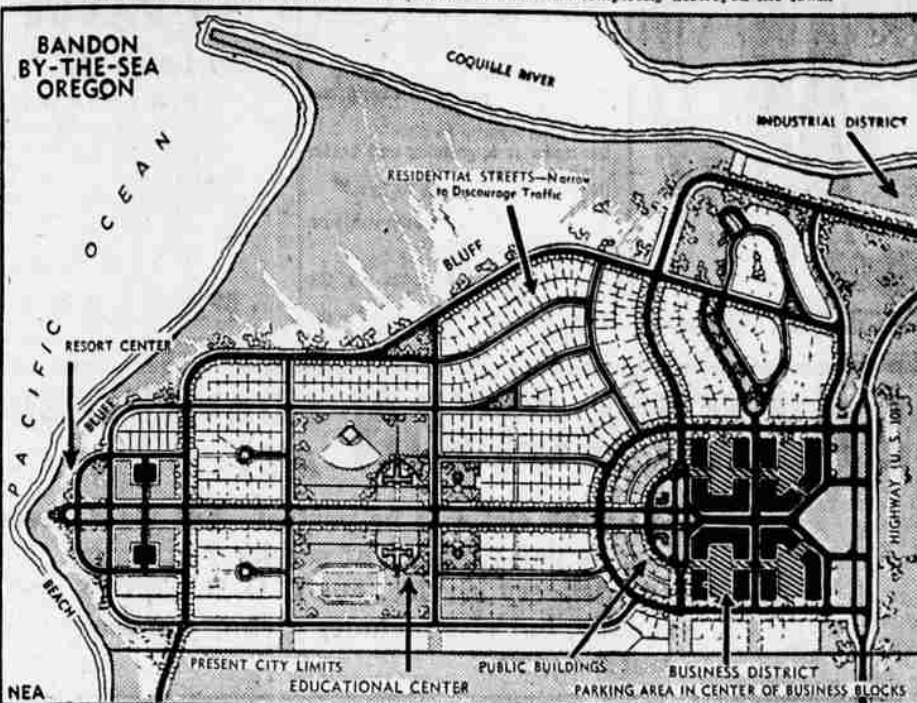
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Here is a scene in Bandon, Ore., in 1936, after a forest fire completely destroyed the town.

BANDON, Ore.—A year ago, Bandon was a mass of smoking ruins, its 1500 homeless people being fed and clothed by relief agencies. A wind-fanned forest fire swept town, destroying all.

Today, Bandon is about to start permanent rebuilding. From its ashes will arise a model town that will take a national place in community planning. Virtually everybody pooled real estate holdings,

planning experts got on the job—and you'll never know the old town by the Coquille river.

In fact, it won't be by the river. Bandon just grew there. Some energetic sailormen started a general store and warehouse 50 years ago when sailing vessels took on coal and lumber. Mudflats were gradually filled in and streets built, but the site was not ideal.

So part of Bandon's reconstruction is moving the business section a quarter mile south to higher land 50 feet from sea level. Another is putting Bandon on an area of 450 acres—half that over which the old town sprawled.

A wide central boulevard will run through the new town. The business center will be in the eastern section, with an area for public buildings separating this from the residential section. Parking areas will be in the center

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RETAIL SALES BRIGHT SPOT IN WEEK'S REPORT

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Retail distribution provided the brightest spot in trade movements this week, Dun & Bradstreet said today in the weekly review of business.

"While gains lacked uniformity," the agency said, "improvement was less scattered and more items fell within the line of demand."

"Reorders to balance fall inventories sustained wholesale volume, with holiday commitments encouraged by prospects of larger payments to Christmas club depositors than a year ago."

"Industrial progress was sidewise, the rise in automobile and seasonal goods operations failing to counterbalance the dip in steel, metal products, and some of the textile divisions."

The agency estimated retail sales for the country as a whole at from 2 to 5 per cent ahead of the previous week and from 5 to 15 per cent better than the comparable week in 1936. Part of the enlarged turnover was attributed to promotions which featured price reductions.

Percentage increases over a year ago in the major geographic areas included Pacific coast 3 to 6.

LUMBER MART SLOW
SEATTLE, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Outlook for the Pacific Northwest lumber industry is for continued slow markets, the West Coast Lumbermen's Association said today.

Production over a number of weeks has been higher than the volume of orders due to accumulated business in the unfilled order files, as the accumulations are shipped out, the association said, rapid reductions in cutting are anticipated.

The volume of orders of 71,134,703 board feet reported to the association by 177 down and operating mills in Oregon and Washington for the week ending October 23 is the lowest total for a full week since the 1935 lumber strike.

Lumber production reported by these mills of 93,384,152 feet was approximately the same as in the previous week and shows the entire industry produced 58.8 per cent of its average cut during 1926-1929.

Shipments of 84,864,064 were considerably lower in volume than any week during the past month.

WESTERN PINE
PORTLAND, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Reports from 126 mills showed last week's new business of 54,190,000 board feet of lumber was 1 per cent under the previous week's mark, the Western Pine Association said today.

Production totaled 80,770,000 feet, a decline from the previous week, and shipments reached 63,963,000 feet, a drop of about five million feet. Orders, production and shipments dropped behind totals for the corresponding week of 1936.
