### MOONEY'S APPEAL IS DENIED AGAIN

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 30.—(AP)—California's supreme court today again refused freedom to Thomas J. Mooney, convicted to San Francisco's 1916 Preparedness day bombing. The high tribunal denied Mooney's petition for a writ of habeas corpus in his latest fight for release from San Quentin penitentiary where he is serving life.

George T. Davis, Mooney's San Francisco attorney, announced he would carry the fight to the supreme court of the United States. He said the decision cleared the way for such action. It would be Mooney's last hope of freedom. The California court held Mooney was given a fair trial and was fairly convicted.

## PAGEANT WILL SHOW BALANCE OF \$228 CASH

New Grandstands Cut Deep Into Cash; "Village" Doesn't Pay Out

### REPORTS TURNED IN

Big "Profit" In Equipment For Future Use Is Bright Spot

With heavy losses recorded on the Pioneer Village and Settlers Valley for last summer's Oregon Trail pageant, the Lane County Pageant association will have a cash balance of \$228 after all bills are paid. There will be a sizeable "profit" on inventory which means equipment good for future pageants. Building new grandstands at the fairgrounds put an unusual burden on the enterprise when Hayward field was found to be not available due to turfing for football.

This was the report gleaned from the meeting of the pageant board of directors, Friday evening, though final audit is not complete. There will be no need to assess merchants who underwrote the huge enterprise.

**\$2,000 in New Stands**  
The association undertook the pageant last summer with a hold-over reserve of \$3,000 from the previous spectacle. The balance of \$228 after the 1937 report, however, does not include \$2,000 spent for grandstand improvements, a permanent asset for the pageant.

New inventory for the 1937 pageant—including grandstands, costumes, permanent equipment, etc.—is estimated to total \$4,000, but no official figure is given as yet until the board makes a thorough check to see how much of that may be from the previous pageant's total.

**Paid Attendance Sets Record**  
Total paid attendance for the 1937 pageant was 15,450 persons the largest number on record for any of the four pageants; and the total gate receipts for this last pageant were \$22,024.89, the audit shows.

Paid attendance was divided as follows for the three nights of the 1937 show: Thursday, 3012 persons;

TOPEKA, Kan., Oct. 30.—(AP)—Senator Arthur C. Capper announced in his Daily Capital today that he had incorporated all his publications and had arranged for a part of the stock to be distributed among the employees. For 41 years Capper had operated his publications as an individual. The new corporation, known as Capper Publications, Inc., has a capital stock of \$1,000,000 and \$325,000 as surplus. All the incorporators are employees of the publications.

The corporation includes the Topeka Daily Capital, The Kansas City Kansan, Household Magazine, various farm publications and radio stations at Topeka and Kansas City, Kan.

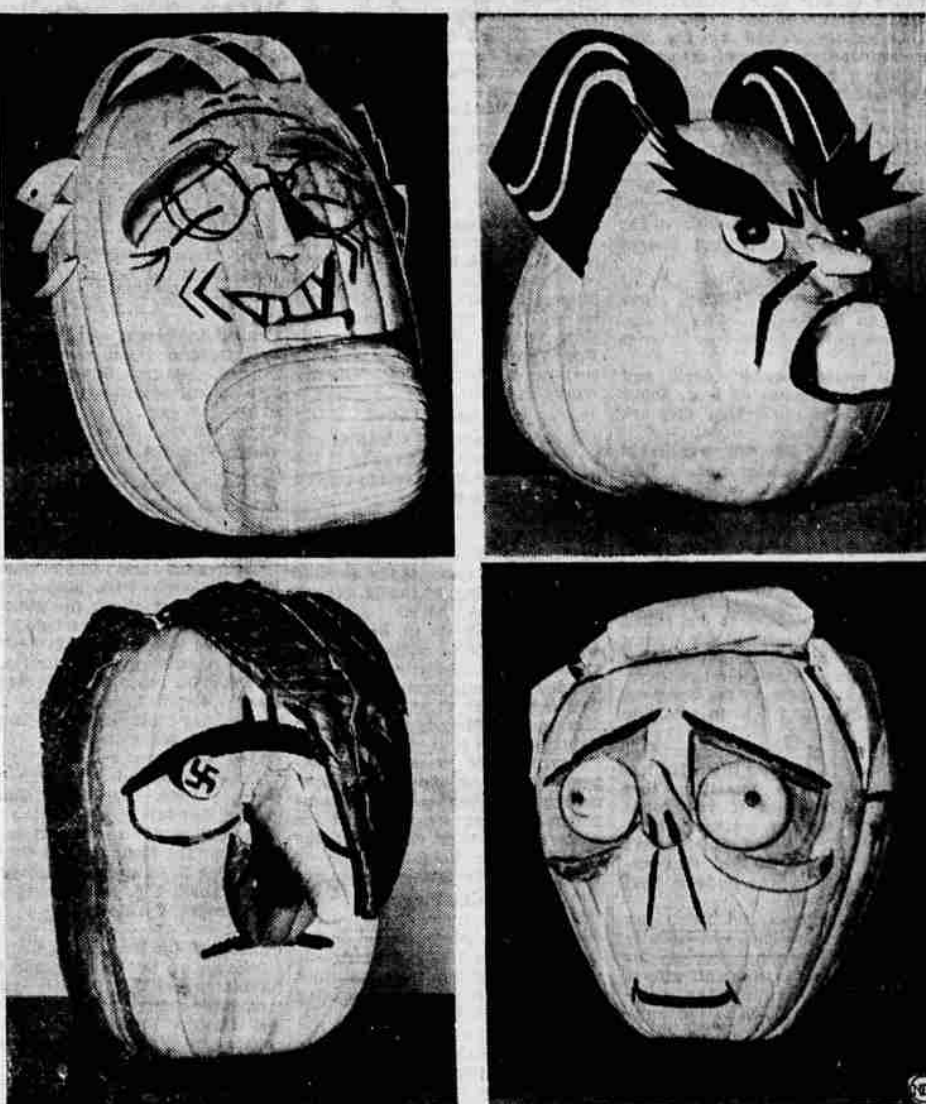
### Yessir, This "T. S." Just "Has No Dog"

## Benson Tech Wins High School Prize

### NON-HI-SCHOOLERS FIX 1938 BUDGETS

Showing a decrease of \$115.95 over last year's budget, the Lane county non-high school district board Saturday morning approved the budget presented for the 1937-1938 fiscal year. The budget had been prepared a few weeks ago and the meeting was held to give final approval.

The budget, as approved, was set at \$60,575.00 and the receipts showed a balance of \$4,090.95 cash on hand on August 24, 1937, making a total of \$56,484.05 to be raised.

The tuition has increased from \$58,000 to \$62,000 while the amount allotted to postage, stationery and printing, and office supplies and equipment was lowered \$50 over last year's budget. Other expenses remained the same.

The "Lantern" of Pendleton high school, The Eric W. Allen cup for the best mimeograph paper was won by the Carlton high school "Hi-Life" and the ward for the best news notes in local papers, the Harris Ellsworth cup, was taken by Baker high school.

Second place in the under 500 division went to the "McMinnville" of McMinnville high school, and third was awarded the Marshall "Hi-Times." In the over 500 classification, Corvallis high's "High O' Scope" was second and the Eugene high school "News" third. 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## ROY HILLS DIES HERE ON FRIDAY

Joseph Roy Hills, one of the owners of the Hills Creek Lumber company at Jasper and member of one of Lane county's most widely known pioneer families died Friday evening at the Sacred Heart general hospital. He had not been in good health for a year and had been in the hospital one week.

Mr. Hills was the oldest child in the family of the late Jasper (Jap) and Florence E. Hills, and had been in the lumber business for 30 years. He was born at Jasper as was his father before him, the community being named after the father. Joseph Roy Hills was born at Jasper, June 7, 1880, and had lived in this section practically all his life. He was married on Sept. 28, 1934, to Pearl M. Bailey.

Surviving are the widow; one daughter, Mrs. Alma Butler of Trent; one son, Merle, at home; a step-daughter, Mrs. Tom Wallace; three brothers, Charles J. Hills of Oakridge, Fred A. Hills of Jasper, and Lawrence D. Hills of Oakridge; four sisters, Mrs. Elsie McKendzie of Heppner, Ore., Mrs. Jessie Stewart of Cottage Grove, Mrs. Grace Walker of Oakridge, and Mrs. Hallie Huntington of Eugene.

Mr. Hills was a member of the Oakridge I. O. O. F. lodge, No. 251.

Funeral services are to be conducted Tuesday at 1:30 p. m. in the Springfield Methodist Episcopal church, Dr. J. D. McCormick officiating. Interment will be in the Mt. Vernon cemetery.

### CHINESE HEROIC BATTALION SAVED

SHANGHAI, Sunday, Oct. 31.—(AP)—The "dare-to-die" battalion of 150 Chinese who for three days have defied Japanese efforts to storm their stronghold in two barricaded warehouses across Soochow creek from the International Settlement, began to emerge alive tonight, their flag still triumphantly flying.

With the cooperation of the British and American defense forces, the Chinese fled over the bridge behind a British-erected barricade into the British area of the settlement.

### Flags and Equipment Saved

The Chinese marched into the British post, where they deposited their arms and awaited the arrival of trucks and ambulances to take them to hospitals and shelters in the settlement. British troops guarded the disarmed "indomitables."

The first contingent of the Chinese comprised 30 men, including eight wounded. They ran the gauntlet of Japanese fire and reached the British post, carrying their flags from the warehouse roofs, as well as machine guns. They said approximately 80 more were coming out shortly. The Japanese turned machine gun fire on the men, despite the danger to streets in the settlement.

### BRITAIN ROUSED

LONDON, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Great Britain may send additional troops to Shanghai as a result of alleged Japanese attacks on British outposts there, it was reported today. Four British soldiers have been killed in China during the last week, and it was reported that the dispatch of reinforcements to Shanghai was being considered.

Britain's present strength in the Far East was regarded officially, however, as "adequate." The government notified all local commanders in the Shanghai area to fire upon attackers if British positions and lives were menaced further.

### Autos Demolished Friday Night in Spectacular Crash

One of the most spectacular automobile crashes reported in some time occurred about midnight Friday when cars driven by Lyman Walker, 1016 Willamette, and Orly Clabby, Cottage Grove, crashed almost head-on just east of the city limits.

Both cars were practically demolished by the force of the collision, but none was seriously hurt in the accident. Scratches and bruises were reported as the only injuries.

The Walker car was proceeding west on the Pacific highway and ran into the Clabby machine near the George Hitchcock residence just west of Judkins Point. One occupant of Walker's car was catapulted across the highway and into a clump of bushes by the force of the crash.

A minor wave of bicycle thefts struck Eugene Friday night with three machines reported missing to city police. Martin Riss, 1358 East Twenty-third avenue, reported his bike stolen from University high school Friday. Betty Bennett, 894 East Twenty-first avenue, reported her machine stolen from 1830 Olive street Friday night. A bike belonging to Wesley Roe was reported missing early Saturday morning.

### Plans for Big Winter Sports Development Being Made

A winter sports area which in time may rival Idaho's Sun Valley and Washington's Mt. Rainier was in sight for Eugene Saturday when a letter from R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, to the Register-Guard told of a \$1,000 state highway appropriation for an experimental opening of the road into the McKenzie pass winter sports area. If traffic warrants enough to keep the road open to the playground will be furnished.

Obsidian club officials were enthusiastic over the state highway commission's granting of a request made to the commission last week by a committee composed of Paul R. Lafferty, Bob Lemon and George H. McMorran. At the Portland meeting, however, the committee was told the chance for the expenditure of the sum requested was unlikely.

### Traffic Needed to Pay Cost

Maintaining the McKenzie highway from a point "near the road to Belknap Springs to Frog Camp, a distance of approximately 12 miles" will be on a trial basis to determine the feasibility of such action and the revenues that would accrue to the state highway fund.

Lafferty, president of the Obsidian club and chairman of the "open road" committee, estimates that 500 cars traveled into the area weekly when open last winter. He expects a material increase in travel after the area is established.

### Snow Conditions Are Ideal

The pass country provides the terrain and stabilized snow for skiing comparable to any in the world, with the Three Sisters in the background, accessible for winter mountaineering, Lafferty says.

Sims Butte, adjacent to Frog Camp, provided a natural slope for a major jump and the terrain is such that fine slalom courses could be constructed. The Obsidian club plans to construct a new lodge near the area and will also renovate the Obsidian cabins for overnight en-

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## "AMERICANS, INC." WOULD SAVE U. S.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 30.—(AP)—Americans, Inc., a new patriotic organization, filed articles with the state corporation department here today. Purposes of the charitable organization, which has headquarters in Portland, include "maintaining constitutional democratic government, promoting good citizenship, actively combating activities of individuals or groups proposing to destroy our form of government and opposing use of schools and other public properties for the purpose of teaching un-American philosophy and spreading foreign propaganda."

Officers were listed as Nelson W. Hibbs, president; R. F. Caples, vice-president; George Stroup, secretary, and Harvey R. Swan, treasurer. Other directors are George H. Neher, Charles Peabody, E. O. Arnold and William H. Blackwell, all of Portland. Louis E. Starr, Portland attorney, made the filing.
