

U. S. TO BID AGAIN FOR WORLD MARKET OF FARM PRODUCTS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Leaders in the powerful house committee on agriculture said today they would favor a new loan-subsidy program to "recapture" the world market for American farm products.

It is intended, they said, that future loans on commodities be made at figures equivalent to the world prices of the commodities.

The difference between that and domestic price level would be made up in subsidies paid to farmers from processing taxes, plus benefits for "conserving soil."

In the past, loans have been made higher than world prices. But the legislators opposed future programs of this kind, saying when the government lends more money on a product than it would bring in world markets, exports are discouraged because the farmer tends to take the loan and store his product as security.

The newly authorized corn loan of 44 to 50 cents a bushel was cited as an example of keeping loans in line with "going prices."

"Had the loan been 60 cents as proposed by some farm interests," said Representative Coffee (D-Neb) "we might have insured a domestic price level but we would have cut off all chance of export."

"If the farmers can get loans at world price levels enough will take them to prevent demoralization of the market and enough will sell to keep supplies moving."

Chairman Jones (D-Tex) said a desirable course would be an effort to secure fair prices in the domestic market and at the same time permit farmers to produce all that can be absorbed both in this country and abroad.

"Any adjustment or control program," he asserted, "should be shaped so foreign markets can be gradually regained."

union, which may develop a sense of responsibility."

Mr. Chapman stated that Portland newspapers were so intimidated by labor interests that a true picture was not being painted by them of the situation existing in the Oregon metropolis.

Freedom Is Uplate

"At least a person still has a right to say what he wants—to express his own honest opinions. It is a great satisfaction to me to find that upstate newspapers still maintain the 'freedom of the press,' Mr. Chapman said.

He told the chamber group that his address before them was the third of about 30 speeches he would make throughout the state in an effort to present a clear picture of what is going on in the state.

He characterized Oregon as one bright spot left among western states as far as honest government was concerned. In Washington, to cite an example, Mr. Chapman said the people would rather have our Gov. Martin than their Gov. Martin because then they would be sure who was the chief executive.

Leaders Needed

"Oregon needs upstate leaders to keep private interests from taking over state and local government," Mr. Chapman reiterated. He pointed out how the AFL controlled the Willamette river, bulldozed mill owners, stopped delivery of logs to mills, laughed at law and order.

In discussing the IEU situation, Mr. Chapman said that it was one labor group which still gave employers and employees a decent chance to work out their own problems without racketeering stopping in. He stated that the United States government was working with the AFL and CIO in their case against the IEU for allegedly being a "company union" by deliberately postponing hearings on the case, running up trial expenses and otherwise impeding the legal end of the situation.

Mr. Chapman said he had no quarrel with labor unions. He said he believed unions were necessary for continued good understanding between employer and employee, and that they were needed to insure employee's rights. He did have a fight, he said, with those labor interests which would control government office and private business.

Mr. Chapman closed his address, which lasted well over 45 minutes, with another plea for citizens to pay attention to the election of public officers. "The AFL is at present the big threat to our democracy and institutions. It is a threat to Americanism. And yet labor unions ARE necessary to better relationships between employer and employee. Our hopes lie in paying attention to election of public officers. We must make ourselves agents for the protection of Americanism—fight so that our children can grow up with the knowledge that they can make a living without having to pay tribute to some labor union."

Mr. Chapman was introduced by Jack Luckey, president of the chamber of commerce. The turnout for the public affairs luncheon was one of the largest in recent months.

LANE FARMERS TO ENTER CORN SHOW

Lane county farmers are being urged to send exhibits to a statewide corn show to be held in the Portland public market building November 29 to December 4 and sponsored by the First National bank of that city.

O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, said Friday he is asking local growers to send exhibits to try for the prizes offered by the bank. There are a number of farmers in this county who make a specialty of raising corn and the county agent said he thought some of them have a good chance of winning prizes.

Each grower is asked to exhibit ten ears of yellow corn. The state will be divided into districts and the winners of first prize in each district will compete for the sweepstakes. Lane county is in the same district with Benton and Linn. There will be prizes in each district in two classes, one class covering all growers except four-H club members and the other class consisting of the clubbers. R. C. Kuehner, club agent, will look after the club exhibits and Mr. Fletcher those offered by adults.

Lebanon Man Named To Education Job

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, today appointed Lester A. Wilcox, superintendent of schools at Lebanon, as a deputy in the department of education.

Wilcox, who taught at Springfield and Clatskanie after graduating from University of Oregon, will take up his new duties in charge of school law, statistics and Americanization, within a few days, Putnam said. The new deputy will succeed John M. Miller and Robert J. Maaske.

33 Lane Farmers Get 1937 Subsidy For Flax Fiber

Checks for 33 Lane county farmers as the federal subsidy on the flax fiber they grew this year were received at the office of O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, Friday morning.

The total amount received was \$4158.38 or an average of \$126.01 per farm. The amount of subsidy paid by the federal government is \$7.50 for each ton of flax fiber straw, net weight.

Thirty-six farmers of Lane county raised flax for fiber this year and all names were sent in but for some unknown reason the checks for three of them failed to arrive. Fletcher said he expected the missing checks to arrive any time.

SPECULATION BAD WARNS ROOSEVELT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today that the more dangerous stock speculation becomes the less people ought to go in for it.

The president made his comment on stock market activities when asked at a press conference if he planned to take any steps to make stock speculation less dangerous.

He said there were two ways of looking at that—the more dangerous it is, the less people ought to indulge in speculation.

He added if it were not dangerous everybody would make money. Asked if he considered the market dangerous, the president said that question did not make sense.

The president, responding to a question about his conference in New York yesterday with Mayor Fiorello La Guardia, referred to news stories about the meeting and added:

"Speculative news stories are just as bad as speculation on the stock exchange." He permitted the direct quotation.
