

BIG NEW PLANES SHOW FIELD NEED

planes were placed in service a year ago.

The situation is even more hopeless now, however, with the Boeing ships already outmoded and huge Douglas "Mainliners," seating 21 passengers, in service at the present time.

Obstructions Here

Main reason why Eugene airport is not used by the big ships, according to Mr. Sweet, is because the field—while big enough in size and length of runways—has impeded approaches from two sides. Present day flying has come to depend on "instrument flying" to a large extent, and in bad weather planes are often forced to land by means of instruments alone. To do this safely there can be no obstructions, such as chimneys, hills or trees, near the field.

The second consideration, that of getting service from smaller, slower ships, seems the answer at the present time, it is claimed. Eugene is in a more favorable spot than Portland at the present time, it was pointed out. Portland has spent huge sums to construct and improve the Swan Island port only to find the major lines about to pass it by because it is already too small for the planes now in use. Observers on the Pacific coast have predicted that mainline passenger and mail service will be handled in huge planes, which will leave Seattle, left briefly at San Francisco, and hit Los Angeles on the second bounce. At that, Seattle is faced with the necessity of enlarging its field.

Portland, Medford, Tacoma and other cities will be served then, so it is said, by twin-motored and single motored ships which can land on their smaller ports. In a situation such as that, Eugene would stand a favorable chance of getting airmail service direct.

150 Out of 2,360

Figures recently released by the bureau of air commerce reveal that but 150 airports out of the 2,360 of all classes are fit to handle planes of the four-motored type. Millions of dollars have been spent on improving most of these fields, and airline executives are vainly trying to work out some plan whereby cities in the "imperfect" class will be able to get some return on their investments. What the answer will be remains to be seen.

Until legislative action is taken

by the United States government to aid cities with the airport problem, or until an airline will "sign on the dotted line" for service to Eugene, Mr. Sweet declared there was no use in even thinking of trying to find a new location for a port.

Colorado, Utah Tilt Ends With Big Riot

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 6.—(AP)—A riot, which started when Colorado students attempted to tear down Utah's goal posts after Colorado won 17 to 7 here today, brought half the crowd of 20,000 spectators surging on the gridiron. Stadium police, trying to stem the fight, handcuffed six riot leaders. Some fighters were dragged from the field by their hair. Noses bled and eyes became blackened in the fight which lasted half an hour. Spectators who didn't join in the melee, cheered from the grandstands.

Indictments Bring Tears From Woman

ST. HELENS, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Tears coursed down the cheeks of Mrs. Agnes Ledford today as she listened to the reading of indictments charging her with deaths by poison of her stepdaughters, Ruth, 13, and Dorothy, 15, in September.

She was given until Nov. 15 to enter pleas but she has previously denied any plot against the girls' lives. They died, presumably, after eating berries upon which wind had blown poisonous spray from an orchard.

Paul Plank of Irving Grange heads this committee. Some 1500 questionnaires have been sent out in this section for a survey to determine how much acreage would be available for a new cannery. This preliminary information is necessary before the committee can take further steps. About 1200 answers are in and the committee expects all will have been answered by the last of the month, Mr. Plank states.

Several officer Pomona groups meet during the next two weeks. The Pomona officers will drill at the 4-H building in Eugene Monday evening, preparatory for initiation at the meeting in Junction City.

The Pomona work committee has called a meeting for November 15 to outline the year's program. On November 22 the masters' council is to meet for an evening session at the 4-H building in Eugene.

L. A. Gunfire Ends In Bandit's Death

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 6.—(AP)—A bandit was killed and a deputy sheriff critically wounded in a gun battle on an east Los Angeles street early today.

Adolf Cortez, 39, was riddled with bullets when he tried to shoot it out with five officers who sought to take him and a companion into custody for the kidnapping and robbery of a service station man last night. Deputy Sheriff Joe H. Wilever was shot through the face. Surgeons gave him a "fifty-fifty" chance to live.

1937 Registrations Bring Record Auto Traffic Into State

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Oregon looked good to tourists during the first ten months of this year, when more of them registered at state checking bureaus than during the entire year of 1936, or during any previous year.

Earl Snell, secretary of state, who compiled the figures, added that every month of this year showed heavier registrations than during the corresponding month a year ago.

Total out-of-state registration Nov. 1 of this year was 143,198, or about 3300 more than the 1936 total.

Three months of the year, June, July and August, brought more tourists than registered during the entire year of 1933. Snell attributed the heavy increase to national recognition of Oregon as a recreational playground, because of advertising and word-of-mouth recommendations.

COOS BAY PORT MAY BE CLOSED

MARSHFIELD, Nov. 6.—(AP)—The port of Coos Bay will be closed to ocean going commerce Monday afternoon unless a truce or settlement is reached in the dispute between longshoremen and the Coos Bay Waterfront Employers association, it was announced today after a meeting of the port labor relations committee had failed to reach a peaceful settlement of troubles that began Thursday.

Longshoremen, members of the C. I. O., refused three times to load lumber sawed at Smith Wood Products company mill in Coquille, 19 miles away, where CIO millworkers are on strike claiming they were discriminated against when an exclusive A. F. of L. contract was recently signed.

Formal notice of suspension of relations was filed this afternoon after the local committee's meeting.

ST. MARGARET'S BAY, Kent, England, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Sir Johnston Forbes-Robertson, famous Shakespearean actor, died today at the age of 84.

Sir Johnston was one of the great actors of the late eighties and early nineties. American audiences thrilled to his "Hamlet."

He appeared in so many plays that his record in "who's who in the theatre" covers nearly three pages. He made his first appearance in 1874 and his final one in 1927 in "Twelfth Night" in London.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 6.—(AP)—J. D. Ross, administrator of the Bonneville power project, arrived here today from Washington, D. C., "looking for customers."

"Right now I want customers," Ross said. "I want to get to work bringing that power to market, but first I must have a market. If industry wants power, it can have it. If the power districts want power, they can have it. If the farmers want power, they can have it. Anybody can have it who wants to buy and pay for it. It is not free."

Parker's Jersey Bull Heads List

Official records just received in Lane county from the American Jersey Cattle club show that Tristram's St. Maves Laddie, a Jersey bull owned by V. A. Parker of Blachly, heads the world list of sires whose daughters produce more than 50 pounds of butterfat. He led in the months of April, May, June, and July. Thirteen daughters of the bull produced more than 50 pounds of butterfat in April, first qualifying him for his position of leadership.

During April, the month in

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which Mr. Parker's bull was qualified for world leadership, one of his cows produced more than 70 pounds of butterfat, and the remaining nine that produced 50 pounds produced from 44 to 60 pounds each. Such a large number of officially tested high producers in one herd is most common and is the more evidence when it is understood that Parker milks his cows only twice daily under ordinary farm conditions. He began official milking only last winter.
