JUNCTION CITY, Nov. 6.—(Special)—Mrs. Lovella Martin and sons, Herman, Virgil and Win-fred, returned Wednesday from Portland where they had been called by the death of the husband and father, Wheeler H. Martin, who had passed away at the Veterans' hospital on Saturday, Oct. 30. Funeral services were held from Holman and Lutz Colonial Mortuary, Portland, Wednesday morning at 9:30 with Chaplain Smith, a com-rade of Mr. Martin in the Spanish wars, conducting the services in charge of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Interment was made in the Lincoln Memorial Park cemetery. Wheeler Herman Martin was born in Buchanan, Mich., Nov. 30, 1875. He was married to Lovella Eagle at Nampa, Idaho, in 1901. They had four children. Mr. and Mrs. Martin have lived west of town for the past six years. He was a Span-ish war veteran and belonged to the Masonic lodge. Mr. Martin had been in poor health for several years and about three weeks ago he entered the hospital in Port-land. He is survived by his wife and son Winfred of Junction City, and two sons, Herman and Virgil of North Bend; one brother, Frank Martin of Boise, Idaho; and two sisters, Mrs. Oscar Percy of Boise.

The AFL building trades council has de-clared a boycott on all IEU and CIO lumber as a major step in their fight against the two power-ful rival unions.

She had been a member of the Christian church for 72 years and was a charter member of the of the Junction City Christian church.

Pitney, de-ceased; Cecil Ernest, deceased; Mildred Edith, deceased; and Francis Alvah. Also surviving are a step-son, Royal W.; and seven grandchildren, Dorr, Janet, Mild-red, Bill, Jimmie, Elvan, and Pauline, a nephew, Harry J. Ewman and a niece, Helen Wager.
