Baby Incubator Saves Life of Eugene Infant

Phyllis Ann, 3½ pounds premature daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Philip P. Wilbur, 212 Tenth avenue, east, is in perfect condition even though she must be viewed in a tiny baby incubator which arrived just four days before Phyllis, on Friday night.

A six-months baby, little Phyllis had small chance of living without the aid of the incubator which had been donated by the local teamsters union. "We want to express our gratitude to them for saving the life of our baby," said Mr. Wilbur Monday afternoon. "Mrs. Wilbur is fine and Phyllis Ann is gaining. What more could you ask?"

The infant is being fed two drams of mother's milk every two hours, by means of a medicine dropper. The incubator provides oxygen as well as temperature control.

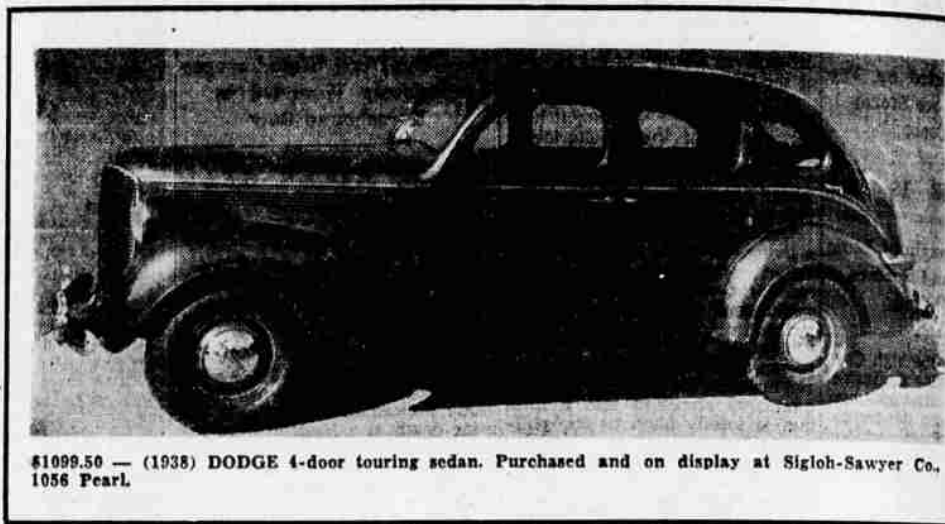
