The building committee reported an inquiry for rental of space in city building recently occupied by the Style shop. As the prospective tenant intends to conduct a bakery, the matter was referred back to the committee with instructions to investigate the matter of possible increase of insurance rates if leased for bakery.

The street committee reported on the matter of graveling certain streets, upon the request of property owners, and upon the deposit by the owners of half of the cost of the gravel. Public liability insurance of city fire truck and other city equipment was increased to \$100,000, \$200,000 limits.

The city treasurer was authorized to pay the interest due on city water bonds, prior to Dec. 1, the due date.

After payment of bills and transaction of routine affairs, the meeting was continued to Monday evening, Nov. 15.

GUARD OFFICIALS VISIT REEDSPORT

REEDSPORT, Nov. 10.—(Special)—A committee of U. S. coast guard officials, composed of Commander M. J. Ryan of the Seattle division; M. P. Jensen, 13th district; Andre Fourchy and Frank W. Decker of the division of construction and repair, spent Tuesday going over the proposed site of the new coast guard station on the inside of Cornwall point near the mouth of the Umpqua river.

The site was approved and recommendation to that effect was sent to the procurement division. Should the procurement division place its approval on the same, the construction work should begin around March 1. The new coast guard site will not only be much more practical, being much closer to the bar with a better view of the harbor mouth, and more accessible by both land and water, but with its natural beauty of location lends itself admirably to the possibilities of landscaping.

Pilchard Fishing Is Halted on Coast Until July Season

REEDSPORT, Nov. 10.—(Special)—Due to unfavorable weather conditions on the coast this fall, pilchard fishing has been discontinued and boats have left for the south to fish in California waters until the season opens again which will probably be the middle of July.

Taking everything into consideration, the officials of the Oregon Pilchard company of ReedSPORT have been very well pleased with the result of the first season's take, approximately 7000 tons having been processed at the local plant and the Arago plant at North Bend which was leased by the local company.

Weather conditions were not ideal all season for the fishing of pilchards, as favorable weather did not last long enough at any one time for the fish to become settled. Compared to fishing elsewhere along the northern coast, and even along the California coast, the results were on a par, however. The two storms early in October were disappointing as the fishing had been exceptionally good and it was hoped would last throughout the month.
