

CALIFORNIA BEATS WEBFOOTS 26 TO 0 IN MUDDY SESSION

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the Oregon 34, Chapman passing to Sparks over the goal line on the fifth play. The final touchdown came after 12 minutes of the third period. Thomas going over from the four to climax an 80-yard drive completed in nine plays.

Numbers Muddy
The gum-like mud that obliterated the numbers on the jerseys and would have handicapped the punting and passing game of most ball clubs, had little or no effect on the Bears. To see them drive through the line, slither off and scamper around ends, boot high spirals and complete bullet passes, you'd have thought the boys had been weaned on the tide-water flats of Oregon's coast country.

Not only did the Golden Bears, maddened by last week's 0-0 deadlock against Washington, rip through and around the Webfoot line for 241 yards, but they pierced the air with six passes, four of which were completed for 57 additional yards. California's defense was deadly and bottled Oregon's running and passing attack tighter than the top on a jar of green olives. The Ducks wallowed 74.5 yards from scrimmage—most of the yardage by Fullback Frank Emmons. And for Oregon's highly-touted aerial maneuvers, the California backs knocked down all but one of 13 attempts.

There was little for Oregon fans to get tonsillitis over. The Webfoot goal-line stands displayed in the Oregon State and Washington State game again came to light, but succeeded only twice in six times—on the 14th in the opening period and on the one-yard stripe in the second canto.

One Thrill Only
Jimmy Nicholson, left halfback, provided the only thrill for the gals with the yellow and green rums, by running back Smith's second-half kickoff 39 yards. The old grads had a chance to sound off their whiskey baritone voices as the ducks continued to drive California goalward. But Lasselle was forced to kick after Oregon penetrated to the California 27 on nine plays. It was the first and last time that Oregon was further than one or two yards past the 50-yard stripe.

There were a few bright bits of Oregon sparkle that loomed up through the mire. Oregon's kicking, weak in previous games, was handled splendidly by Dale Lasselle and Ted Gebhardt. Even with Steve Anderson's partially blocked punt that netted 11 yards, the Oregon average was 34 yards. The defensive playing of Cece Walden at right guard and the offensive drive of Frank Emmons, playing his first varsity game at fullback, were a few trinkets Coach Prink Callison carried off above the smashing, and not surprising wallowing.

It was a beautifully coached team, that bunch of Golden Bears, and Pacific coast fans should be proud to be represented against the east—probably Pittsburgh again—by Allison's golden-shirted and stout-hearted warriors.

Coming to California six years ago from Wisconsin first as assistant coach to Navy Bill Ingram the genial Allison, who says he'd quit coaching if he couldn't keep smiling in victory and defeat, has developed a powerful club since relieving "Navy Bill" of the varsity reins in 1935. The Bears can be counted on the erase that "Roy Regels" Rose Bowl defeat a number of years ago to Georgia Tech.

No one player took the lions' share in California's victory. The first and second teams performed equally well and the third-string managed to hold the weary Webfoots on even terms during the final frame.

Drive to Goal
Maddened by being stopped within the 20 yard line in the first few minutes of play, California's unbeaten eleven opened a drive in the closing minutes of the opening period from the Oregon 49 and with Bottari and Anderson carrying the ball, drove to a touchdown on the second play of the second period. Anderson hurdling the center of the Oregon line from the two yard line. The force of his smash drove three Webfoots to the end zone. Chapman kicked the extra point.

The scoring march was featured by three consecutive first downs and an 11-yard gallop by Chapman.

Bottari's 17 yard return of Lasselle's kick, placed the ball on the Oregon 23 led to the second California score after 11 minutes of the second quarter. Bottari and Anderson drove to the 15 from

On the next play, Chapman drove through his own right tackle and crossed the goal line standing up. Chapman's kick was wide making the score 13 to 0.

Emmons' fumble on the Oregon 34 after the kickoff was recovered by Stoll. Chapman made five to the 29 and then Bottari faded back and pitched a strike to Meek who took it on the 20 and ran to the 16. Another pass Bottari to Meek was good for eleven yards to the 5. On the next play Chapman passed to Sparks across the goal line for the third touchdown of the period. Sparks' kick made it 20-0. With but 25 seconds to play, Anderson's desperate pass after the returning of the kick off to the Oregon 33 was intercepted by Meek on the California 45 as the half ended.

WILLAMETTE PLAN HAS NEW IMPETUS

An important meeting of the citizens' advisory committee on valley development will be held Wednesday night it was announced Saturday by John F. Durr, chamber of commerce secretary. The meet will start at 7:30 o'clock at the chamber of commerce.

The committee will discuss future plans on publicity and promotion work in connection with the great proposed Willamette valley project, which got a setback recently when army engineers reported adversely on immediate recommendation to construct seven big dams in Lane and Linn counties to control flood waters of the Willamette, Long Tom, McKenzie and Santiam rivers.

The local group was considerably heartened Saturday with the report that the Portland chamber of commerce had voted unanimously to support the valley project and work towards getting it passed by congress.

Members of the citizens' advisory committee, which numbers 100 prominent Lane residents, were silent regarding possible plans when interviewed Saturday.

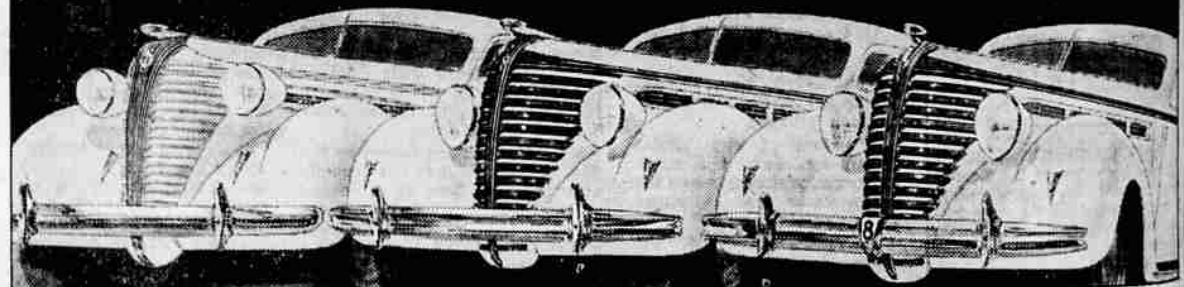
HAD IT IN WRITING
