

KU KLUX KLAN IS PROBED FOR RAID ON FLORIDA CLUB

MIAMI, Fla., Nov. 16.—(AP)—Authorities investigated today a raid by men and women in Ku Klux Klan regalia on the La Paloma night club. The proprietor said the place was ransacked, entertainers were assaulted and a sum of money stolen.

Al Yount, operator of the resort on the outskirts of town, reported to the sheriff's office the raiders descended last night following a public initiation of 150 new klansmen at a city playground, ordered his patrons to leave and forced the club to close.

He charged \$300 in cash and a \$7 watch was stolen from him and that someone kicked a hole in a \$25 bass drum. The club was badly damaged.

Virginia Daw, an entertainer, said she was knocked unconscious and \$10 was taken from her.

The Klan initiation was held at city-owned Moore park by the light of three flaming crosses.

Bob Hunter, a waiter at the club, estimated 200 persons, including some women, participated in the raid, burning a fiery cross opposite the place.

A delegation swarmed in while the orchestra was playing. The raiders ordered all the customers and employees to stand up and be searched for weapons and then ordered everybody out with a threat to burn the place. The threat was not carried out.

Yount was away at the time and Hunter said the raiders choked three girl entertainers while questioning them as to his whereabouts. The waiters also were manhandled and some furniture was smashed, he said.

Yount returned after the raiders had departed and the club reopened in a few hours, but only a few patrons were present. Yount said he planned to continue operation tonight.

Paddock said none of the prisoners in the cell block where the convicts escaped gave out an alarm. Prison officials were apprised of the escape only after Corbett freed himself and notified them.

State police immediately issued an alarm over the teletype system and troopers and local authorities were scouring Syracuse and vicinity in an effort to apprehend the trio.

Lane Fined \$100 For Failure to Stop at Accident

Robert E. Lane, a Lane county farmer, was fined \$100 by Justice of the Peace John Bryson Tuesday on a charge of failing to stop at the scene of an automobile accident but the fine was suspended and Lane was placed on parole for six months. The arrest was made by a state police officer and Nelson Whipp, deputy sheriff.

Otto Irwin Lamb was fined \$5 on a charge of violating the basic traffic rule and Ben O. Everson was fined \$1 on a charge of operating a truck more than 72 inches wide without clearance lights.

WORK OF Y. M. IS TOPIC FOR ROTARY

What is the Y. M. C. A. in Eugene—it is the citizens of Eugene. It is not a building, but a movement, a fellowship for the building and construction of character, and whatever is done along that line here is done by the people of Eugene.

Such was the explanation expressed by W. P. Walter, Y. M. secretary, in a talk for the Rotary club, Tuesday night. Introduced by Carl G. Washburne as "one of Eugene's leading manufacturers, a man who is in the business of manufacturing character," Mr. Walter told the club what the Y. M. is attempting and what it is accomplishing. It is significant that the local association now has no building or physical plant from which to operate since the situation shows that is not the building but the program and the ideals which the group carries on that count, Mr. Walter said.

The Y. M. is attempting to marshal all the forces right in Eugene to assist in the work of character building, he said. Mr. Walter then discussed the H-Y organization as set up in Lane county, pointing out what a fine work it is doing for a large group of boys. He told of the young men's class, of the program of counseling and guidance work carried on through the Y. M., of the work carried on in the Three-C camps. He quoted several illustrations of guidance and help given young people to prove that all the problems handled are Eugene's problems.

Supplementing Mr. Walter's remarks was a brief talk by William M. Tugman, Register-Guard managing editor, who agreed with Mr. Walter that "whatever salvation there is, it is up to us. Under such a set-up and with those goals in mind there are unlimited possibilities for such a program here, he added. There is work here to be done and it is up to us to get it done, he concluded.

Raymond Torrey introduced the speakers, J. L. Woodworth was welcomed as a new member.

For the meeting next Tuesday, Fred Smith, district governor, is to be here and will address the noon meeting. In the evening at 7 o'clock he will meet all officers and chairmen at dinner at the Osburn hotel.

MOVIE GANGSTER CHARACTER DIES OF BULLET WOUNDS

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Hymie Miller, who could act an underworld part well enough to be in the movies, died last night of four bullet wounds, the culmination of some private drama of his own life.

He said a gunman invaded his bedroom and shot him.

Today he was to have started work at the Warner Brothers studio, in the role of a gangster.

Detectives were waiting at his hospital room door, hoping he would survive long enough to give them more information, but Miller expired after several blood transfusions without providing a clue.

His bedroom was dark when the intruder entered his apartment the night before, he said. All he could see was the figure of a man silhouetted against a window. The man shot him and slinked away. He knew of nobody who would have reason to kill him.

Miller came here five years ago from New York. He was of the sporting element and was a heavy gambler. There have been several evidences of an invasion of eastern gambling racketeers into the movie colony. The assassination of Les Bruneman in a beer parlor two weeks ago was one. But police had no information associating Miller with any of the known syndicates.

When he first came here, he managed prize fighters for a while, until he bought a restaurant, and played minor parts in the movies.

The contrast was so astounding Mr. Hutton seemed to hear normally, he uses no hearing aids and persons close to him think he hears "perfectly."

The specific reason for Mr. Hutton's recovery is not known. But some of the circumstances possibly tied in with "allergic" recoveries known to medical science.

It is easy to understand the bad effects on hearing from the "allergy" hay fever. It is not so easy to understand why sultry food may occasionally affect the ears.

ELEVEN KILLED IN CRASH OF AIRLINER

OSEND, Belgium, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Eleven persons, including five members of the former royal family of Hesse, died today in the flaming wreckage of a Belgian airliner which crashed near here while trying to land at Steene airport during a fog.

The dead included the Grand Duke George von Hesse Bel Rhein and his wife, the former Princess Cecile of Greece and Denmark; their two children, Ludwig and Alenbach; and the Grand Duke's mother, the Dowager Grand Duchess von Hesse Bel Rhein.

The dead former Princess Cecile was a first cousin of the Duchess of Kent.

Two Germans were in the party, en route to the wedding of Prince Ludwig von Hesse, attaché to the German embassy in London, and Margaret Campbell Geddes, daughter of Sir Auckland and Lady Geddes. They were to have been married on Saturday.

The two were the von Hesse maid, Lina Henar, and a man named Z. U. Wisenbach. The crew of three also was killed. The eleventh person was not at once identified.

Ten days ago the Obsidians "brushed out" a mile of the Skyline trail to facilitate "ski lauffers." The trail has been cleared of brush for a width of 20 feet, and several steep slopes and turns are expected to give skiers a fast and exciting run.

Next Sunday, it was reported, Obsidian members will hike in to Sunshine shelter, at the base of the

Middle Sister, and place poles on the open side of the structure. The shelter will then be usable during the winter months.

Twenty-five steel cots will be placed in the old Obsidian cabins near Lost Creek Ranch. The cots have been donated by the forest service.

The next case to come up for trial is that of Walter Sutherland against Sher Khan.

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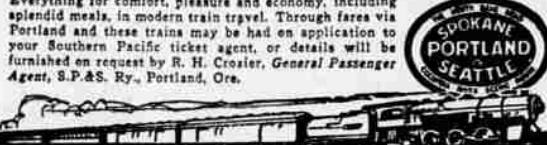
