average citizen the grangers favored a graduated land tax.

For Business Basis

"Our government should be run on a strictly business basis," the report said, "and every kind of property or business should contribute to the support of government which protects it."

Discontinuance of the practice of the agricultural extension service working with farm bureaus in some states to the exclusion of other farm organizations, was urged in another resolution, which asserted "the federal programs have given the opportunity for an unfair advantage by a farm organization."

Another resolution favored enactment of legislation for crop insurance, early application of which would be limited to a few basic agricultural commodities usually produced in exportable surplus volume.

Adopt Resolutions

Grange support was pledged for sound legislation which would make it possible for tenant farmers to become home owners. The resolution expressed opposition to corporation farming.

Other resolutions pledged: Opposition to granting statehood to Hawaii. Support of such flood control as may be agreed upon by the states and federal government, but it was urged that no state surrender water rights to the federal government. Support a movement to eliminate unnecessary and duplicating agencies of the federal government. Support a large appropriation for rural electrification, and urged ratification of the treaty with Canada for completion of the St. Lawrence seaway and power project.

Connally, D., Texas, was organizing speakers to carry on the anti-lynching bill filibuster until the farm bill is ready for debate. The farm measure will take precedence.

Suggest Sales Tax

Borah interrupted Bailey's discussion of the constitutional aspects of the anti-lynching bill to suggest a sales tax.

"If we were to repeal the undistributed profits tax and put the burden on the people who have no profits through a sales tax would the senator still favor repeal as he advocated yesterday?"

Borah explained that he was referring to a statement by Harrison that he knew of only two ways to provide substitute revenue—broaden the income tax base or a manufacturers' sales tax.

The debate concluded with a statement by Harrison that he did not know of any specific plans for broadening the income tax base or imposing a manufacturers' sales tax in event the undistributed profits tax were repealed.

"I take it that you do not have any such plan," Borah said to the

E. C. Kull, Spanish War Veteran, Dies

Edward Charles Kull died at his home near Donna Wednesday evening. He was born in Norwalk, Iowa, June 29, 1882, and left that state when he was a young man and served in the Spanish-American war. He was in the Philippine Islands three years, settling in Archer, Neb., upon his return to the United States. October 22, 1907, he married Miss Bertha Landon at Central City, Neb., and moved to Oklahoma, living there four years. He then moved to Oregon, settling in the Cloverdale district and for the past three years has lived near Donna.

He is a Spanish-American war veteran. Surviving him are his widow, Mrs. Bertha Kull; one son, Howard, at home; one daughter, Mrs. Hazel Campbell, Eugene; one brother, John Kull, Iowa. Funeral announcements will be made later from the Phil Bartholomew chapel in Springfield.

selection of a site, more definite plans can be made. However, the school board has no funds at the present time to put into an athletic field. But it is believed that a 6 per cent increase in the tax levy—amounting to some \$10,000—would be possible in 1938.

In the meantime the school board will work cautiously in combing the city for an adequate location for the field—and possibly a building. "There may be an ideal site near at hand which we have overlooked," MacLaren said.

A chamber of commerce committee, headed by Stanley Stevenson, and including Shy Huntington, Dr. Edward E. Gray, Claire Kneeland, Clyde Chilton, and "Skeet" Manerud, are working in the same direction. The two groups will coordinate their efforts.

The "campaign" for an athletic field is a result of the current football season when the local high schools were limited to a total of two home games. In past years the preppers have depended on the University of Oregon for playing facilities, but the turning of Hayward field last spring caused a curtailment of the schools' home football schedules.
