Grove Chamber Plans Booster Program

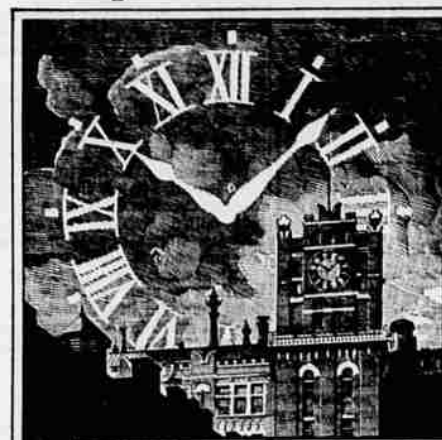

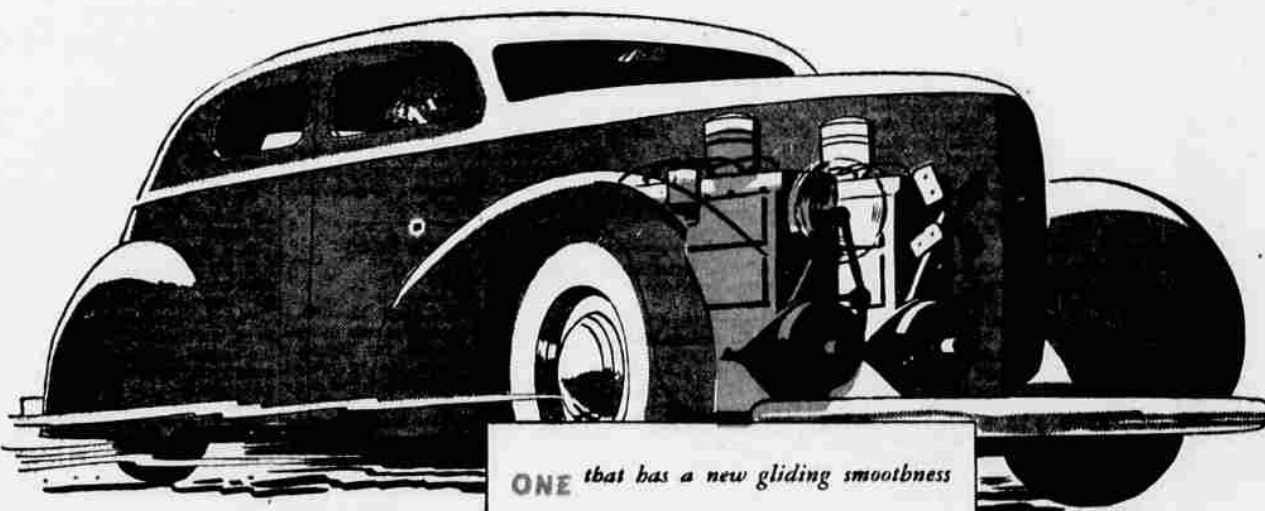

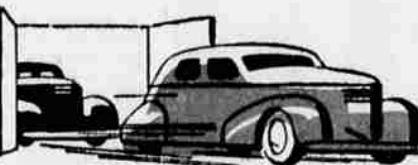
