Frances Willard school unit in Eugene made the largest gain among the Lane county groups in membership, Whiteaker of Eugene attaining the nearest to 100 per cent membership according to school enrollment.

Mrs. W. S. Love, state national P-T. A. magazine chairman for this section, won recognition for her successful program and for her efforts the national P-T. A. magazine is sending her the national convention to be held in Salt Lake City, Utah, May 15-21.
