

Congress Nearing End of Session; Bill Said Dead

Administrator Harry L. Hopkins among the government re-organization bill, condemned by organized opponents on the grounds it would confer dangerously great powers on Mr. Roosevelt, was abandoned for this session yesterday.

Chairman James F. Byrnes, D. S. C., and Acting Chairman Lindsay Warren, D. N. C., of the senate and house committees which handled the bill, announced the controversy would not be revived at this session. The announcement said the question would be considered when the 76th congress convenes next January.

Highway Measure In Conference

The senate has passed the 1938 federal aid highway bill, which was passed May 5 by the house, Congressman James W. Mott informed the Register-Guard Wednesday. In reporting the house bill to the senate the senate committee on roads followed the recommendation of the president and reduced the amounts authorized by the house bill to aid the states in their road building programs.

The house bill as amended by the senate has been referred to a conference committee, composed of five members of the house committee on roads and five members of the senate roads committee, and the conference committee will endeavor to reconcile the differences between the bill as passed by the house and as amended by the senate.

Congressman Mott, who is a member of the house committee on roads which drafted the bill, is also a member of the conference committee. He stated that he will accept no reduction in the amount of road funds authorized by the house bill and that he intends to file a minority conference report in event a majority of the conference should agree to the senate amendments.

The conference report will be sent to the house and senate this week and it is thought a vote upon it will be reached in both bodies by June 4.

Demands University
The United States specifically demanded the return of the University of Shanghai to the Northern and Southern Baptist Missionary societies. The university has been occupied by Japanese military and naval units, the note said, since shortly after the outbreak of hostilities at Shanghai, August, 1937.

The note asserted the university premises "have been used by the Japanese for quartering troops and for military offices," and added that airplanes were stationed on the campus and a supplemental runway for planes constructed "on the adjacent golf course which has been converted by the Japanese into a military flying field."

"During the period of Japanese occupancy several buildings have been damaged and the majority looted," the note continued.
