WASHINGTON, June 13.—(AP)—That President Roosevelt had approved proposals shifting the entire cost of flood control reservoirs on the federal government was heard from usually informed sources in the national capital.

Referendum Petitions
Filed In Springfield

SPRINGFIELD, June 13.—(Special)—Carrying approximately 220 signatures, eleven referendum petitions to refer Springfield's water franchise, recently granted to the Mountain States Power company by the city council, to a vote of the people, were filed in City Recorder C. L. Aldrich's office Monday. Other petitions still being circulated were expected later in the day.

Mr. Aldrich stated the petitions are to be filed immediately in the Lane county clerk's office, where the names will be checked against the registration roll for genuineness.

The franchise, passed by the city council May 23, is scheduled to go into effect June 23 if the referendum is successful. If the referendum is officially okayed, the franchise will be submitted to the legal voters of the city of Springfield for their approval or rejection at the regular city election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1938.

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Wrecked TWA Plane
Found In Yosemite

YOSEMITE, Calif., June 13.—(AP)—A young hunter of gold who followed his "hunch" led the way today to the wreckage of a storm-tossed TWA airliner missing with nine persons aboard since the night of last March 1.

The shattered plane and the bodies of its occupants lay near the top of 9,000-foot Buena Vista peak, 18 air miles south and east of Yosemite valley ranger headquarters; the region, one of the wildest in the Sierra Nevada, is 90 miles east of Fresno.

H. O. Collier, 24, a mining prospector from Fresno, told Chief Ranger Forest Townsley last night he had found the ship Sunday morning. Eight bodies were scattered nearby, said Collier.

As evidence he had found the plane, Collier produced an aviator's brief case stamped with the name of H. M. Salisbury of Kansas City, Mo., TWA co-pilot and a passenger on the ship.

Those aboard were: Passengers—J. Tracy Dirlam, 22, Mansfield, Ohio, a Stanford university student; Mary Lou Dirlam, 18, sister of J. Tracy Dirlam; Victor Krause, Lincoln, Neb.; L. B. Walts, San Francisco oil salesman; Mrs. L. B. Walts; Harvey M. Salisbury, 34, TWA co-pilot, traveling as a passenger.

Crew members—Pilot John Graves, 35; Co-pilot C. W. Wallace, 29, of Tucson, Ariz.; Martha M. Wilson, Philadelphia, stewardess.

More than 200 Lane county national guardsmen will entrain Tuesday morning at 6:00 for Camp Cascap for two weeks' summer camp duty.

To Take Ships
From War Zone

Japanese Seek Clear Path Up Yangtze in Attack Against Hankow

SHANGHAI, June 13.—(AP)—The United States government today informed Japan it had no intention of curtailing the activities of American warships on the Yangtze river to clear the path for the Japanese drive toward Hankow.

The warships, Washington told the Japanese through Admiral Harry E. Yarnell and Frank P. Lockhart, consul general at Shanghai, were there to protect American lives and property.

It was learned authoritatively that Lockhart, in replying to a warning from Masayuki Tani, Japanese ambassador-at-large in China, pointed out that the warships would continue to be sent anywhere deemed necessary to carry on their protective duties.

Gunboat on Job

The United States Gunboat Menominee remained at Kiangling, Yangtze port at the upper limit of what Japanese naval authorities Saturday designated as a "danger zone." It was stationed there for protection of some 40 Americans at Kiangling or the nearby mountain resort of Kuling.

Admiral Yarnell was understood to have informed Nelson T. Johnson, American ambassador to China, now at Hankow, that he still planned an inspection trip up the Yangtze to Nanking, starting June 25.

British naval authorities, it was learned, had taken a similar stand against Japanese moves to keep the river closed to foreign shipping and waterfront of neutral powers. Yarnell's report to Johnson was understood to have pointed out that American warships were marked plainly and could be identified readily by the Japanese.

It was understood that Vice Admiral Sir Percy Noble, commander in chief of the British China station, held that it was the responsibility of the Japanese to identify their targets.

Ankang Captured

Powerful Japanese land and river forces today captured Ankang, capital of Anhwei province, in a swift thrust up the Yangtze river toward Hankow. China's provisional capital, less than 200 miles farther inland.

Rising flood waters of the Yellow river, imperiling Japan's offensive through Honan province, increased the possibility that the drive by land and water up the Yangtze may become the main attack on China's seat of government.

A Japanese army spokesman acknowledged that fighting in the Chengchow sector, where Japanese are besieging the junction of the Lunghai and Peiping-Hankow railroads, was being hampered by mud and rain.

Japanese army engineers said the Yellow river had risen 15 feet but must rise another 15 before the situation could be considered perilous.

President-Gillette Discuss Primary At 5-Course Luncheon

WASHINGTON, June 13.—(AP)—A joint conference committee agreed today on a compromise draft of the administration's multi-billion dollar relief bill.

Two items in the bill—\$212,000,000 for additional farm benefits and \$1,000,000 for administrative expenses—were returned to the house for a separate vote because they were not included in the house-approved bill.

If these are accepted, the relief program will aggregate \$3,753,000,000, compared with \$3,723,000,000 approved by the senate and \$3,154,000,000 approved by the house.

The additional \$30,000,000 added by the committee was for federal public buildings.

The senate bill had provided \$5,000,000 for this purpose.

Man Is Grabbed By Donkey; Is Case of "Mistaken Identity"

NEWPORT, June 11.—(AP)—Jack Tepolt doesn't think he looks like a dog but that is the only way a pet donkey of his children attacked him.

Tepolt, bending over, was seized by the chin by the donkey, which began to stomp. In the animal's mouth, Tepolt freed himself before he was trampled, although his chin and hand were lacerated.

The children have always found the donkey docile and Tepolt said the only explanation he could give for the attack was the fact that dogs have teased the animal and, in his bending position, the donkey mistook him for a dog.

Three Men Charged
With Snagging Fish

Publication of a recent news story to the effect that men and women were flocking to the tail race of the Eugene municipal power plant below Waltherville to snag the salmon that were trying to mount the falls at the plant, took a state police officer to that point Sunday. Result: three men were arrested on a charge of snag-hooking salmon.

The officer who made the arrest says the law allows that salmon shall only be taken with hooks in the mouth and even though they are caught in this manner and afterward snagged, it is against the law.

Lawrence Spores was arraigned before Justice of the Peace John Bryson on a charge of snaggling and defacing forest trees on land owned by U. W. Ellmaker near Elmira. It is alleged that he peeled the bark from chittam trees. He pleaded not guilty and will be tried Thursday. Deputy Sheriff Bert Hulegaard made the arrest.

Ralph Detering, arrested Saturday on a drunken driving charge, was fined \$150 after he had pleaded guilty and Malcolm Almack was fined \$250 for having four persons in the front seat of a car.

Agreement Reached
On Relief Program

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Concentration
Held Threat

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., June 13.—(AP)—Senator Arthur R. Vandenberg (R-Mich.) said today that "representative democracy" is threatened by a drift "toward the concentration of central power in executive hands."

"We are nearer to government by executive decree and by bureaucracy than ever before in our history," he declared in a speech prepared for the Union College commencement.

Senator Vandenberg, who received an honorary degree of doctor of civil law, termed the situation a "crisis in character."

"I speak to you in the profound belief that the crisis which America confronts is infinitely more than a crisis in government or economics; that it is, above all else, a crisis in character—the character of our institutions, the character of citizenship itself," the senator declared.

Grand Jury Called
On Cash Kidnaping

MIAMI, Fla., June 13.—(AP)—A special grand jury was empaneled today to consider evidence against Franklin Pierce McCall in connection with the kidnaping-slitting of James Bailey Cash, Jr., but illness of State Attorney George A. Worley delayed action on the case until tomorrow.

The jury elected a foreman and took up matters presented by an assistant prosecutor.

An uncle of McCall whose name was not disclosed arrived from Jasper, Fla., today to visit him. He was the first visitor the 21-year-old truck driver had since federal agents announced he had confessed the single-handed abduction of "Skeegie" Cash.

Sheriff D. C. Coleman, who first arrested McCall and turned him over to agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, said the \$5,000 offered as rewards by a newspaper, the city of Miami Beach and others, would be returned to the donors.

"There was no outside help in breaking this case," Coleman said. "The federal men cannot accept rewards and I don't want to this time."

Willamette Lumber Wage Scale Said Weak Link in Area

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 13.—(AP)—A drive to gain 100 per cent union organization in Willamette valley sawmills was voted by the Oregon-Washington council of Lumber and Sawmill workers at a special session here yesterday.

In a resolution scheduling the drive, the Willamette valley district was described as the weak link in the lumber wage situation with mills in that area paying as low as 30 cents an hour in contrast to the union scale of \$5 for an eight-hour day.

The council asserted that cutting of wages is not the solution to the lumber industry's problems.

Crashes Auto
At Roseburg

Unidentified Man Is Dead After Exciting Chase From Eugene

A chase by state police officers near Eugene, a road race with police near Roseburg, a suicide attempt and a crash into a two-story building in the latter city featured a spectacular afternoon for an unidentified man who died in a Roseburg hospital.

The series of happenings that featured the man's flight from Eugene to Roseburg began early Sunday afternoon when someone telephoned the Eugene state police office that a car bearing a Vancouver, B. C., license had been abandoned in an old prune orchard near the west end of Horn lane. When officers approached a man was seen to run from the car and disappear in the brush brandishing a gun which he did not fire.

The next heard from the man was that he had stolen a car owned by Raymond Ohlsen of Eugene. The local police broadcast the news of the theft and two state troopers of Roseburg met the man on the highway. They turned around and gave chase and when he ignored their stop warning, the officers fired but apparently without effect for the fugitive sped through the city with the officers in pursuit. At the south limits of the city the car suddenly swerved into a building with such force it caved in the wall and penetrated into a room in which the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Reed, and another person were sitting. They were slightly injured.

The driver was unconscious with a bullet wound in his head and powder burns on his face. The police assume the crash resulted from his apparent attempt at suicide.

Car Said Stolen

The car from which the man fled as the officers approached it at the end of Horn lane was stolen from the Vancouver Motors company, Limited, June 10. It was taken from the Vancouver company's "drive yourself" garage. Vancouver police identified the car through the number but said they could offer no clues to the identity of the driver.

Eugene state police officers spied the Ohlsen car after it had been stolen here but the thief outdistanced them. It was then that the broadcast of the theft of the car was made resulting in the subsequent exciting events.

Nothing was found in the man's clothing that would identify him. He was about 25 years old and well dressed.

PORTLAND, June 13.—(AP)—Mrs. F. D. Forbes forgot to turn off an electric plate when she left her home to watch the rose festival parade. The resultant fire damaged the Forbes home to the extent of \$750, fire investigators estimated.

Third Quake Series Rocks Belgian Area

BRUSSELS, June 13.—(AP)—The third series of earth shocks in three days awakened Belgians early today, but did no damage.

Today's first quake was fairly sharp and lasted about three seconds. Another 11 minutes later was barely perceptible. The shocks were felt between Brussels and the sea.

Officials at the Uccle observatory said slight tremors might continue for several days. The worst quake occurred Saturday when three persons were killed and about 20 injured.
