A. M. Goltra, HALSEY, July 7.—(Special)—Friends of Albert Melvin Goltra were grieved to learn of his death Sunday morning at his home in Albany following a lingering illness. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from the Fortmiller funeral home in Albany with Rev. Charles Welch, pastor of the Evangelical church, officiating. Interment was in the Masonic cemetery. Mr. Goltra was born in Springfield, Illinois, April 19, 1861. He lived in his native state, in Missouri and Kansas before coming to Oregon. He was a barber by trade and followed his trade for 52 years, or until two months ago when he sold his shop in Halsey to J. V. Alcorn and then he and his wife moved back to Albany from whence they came several years ago. Two children, Charles Goltra of Albany and Mrs. Pearl Vaughn of Jacksonville, Florida, survive; also his widow, Maude E. Ison Goltra; three grandchildren; four great grandchildren; two brothers and one sister, living in Kansas.
