



To take mystery out of heredity, a chart is being constructed at the California Institute of Technology which will show how and why persons are fat and others thin, some brown-eyed and others blue-eyed. 1628 U. S. POSTAGE 1938

THUNDERING Henry Hudson, exploring the Atlantic coast, first sailed into Delaware Bay for the Dutch in 1609. The next year Lord De la Warr is said to have entered the bay for England, hence the name Delaware, which the country eventually took.

Further exploration, however, stirred the Dutch, and about the time that the Puritans were establishing themselves in New England the first settlement on Delaware soil was made by them in 1631 near the present site of Lewes, "for the cultivation of grain and tobacco as well as to carry on the whale fishery in that region." The settlement, however, was soon completely destroyed by the Indians.

Undaunted, new colonists under the South company of Sweden planned settlement in 1638. But in 1638, Peter Minuit planted the first real Swedish community in the New World at what is now Wilmington, naming it "Christinaham," in honor of the child queen, Christina. He named the entire territory "New Sweden," although it was actually settled jointly by Swedes and Finns. New Sweden was to last until 1655, when peg-legged Peter Stuyvesant with seven vessels and as many hundred men conquered it and annexed it to New Netherlands.

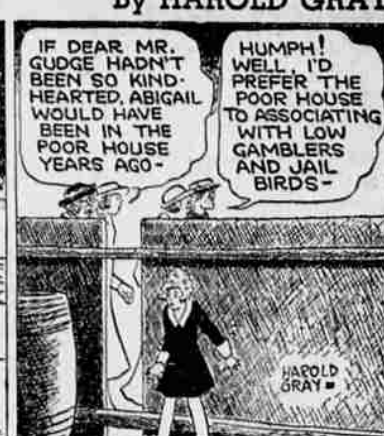
