High School Opens In New Building

HARRISBURG, Sept. 12.—(Special)—The Harrisburg schools opened today with a good attendance. The high school, a union district, for the first time in its history has building of its own. It is a \$45,000 structure of concrete, located just south of the old building and is modern in every respect.

H. K. Vannice is returning as principal. Others returning to their old positions are Ray Warren, who teaches industrial arts, mathematics and boys' coach; Georgina Clark, who teaches girls' health and physical education; Mildred Walker, will teach commerce and home economics. Miss Ann McDougal of McMinnville is a new teacher this year and will give music and English. Another addition to the old staff is Donald Reese, who will give instruction in band music.

The enrollment for the first day was 102, an increase over last year of eight. More are expected to enroll later.

The grade school will now occupy the building formerly used jointly by the grade and high schools. A number of repairs have been made on the building; the exterior painted, the interior kalsomined and painted, new tables made and the rooms remodeled in general.
