Farm Mortgages Seldom Higher Than 5 Percent

The interest charge on Farm Mortgage Loans insured by the Federal Housing Administration cannot be higher than 5 per cent, with a mortgage insurance premium charge of 1/4 to 1/2 per cent. Payments are made monthly, semiannually, or annually, in equal installments, depending upon the distribution of the farmer's income throughout the year.

The loan may be repaid over a period of 20 years. In cases of new home construction for owner occupancy where the loan does not exceed \$5,000, 25 years may be allowed for repayment.
