

Registration Figures Show Democrats Gain

SALEM, Oct. 12.—(AP)—First registration totals filed with the secretary of state today indicated that the number of eligible voters in the November general election would not exceed the record 1935 general election figure of 546,034. Columbia county has 10,122 registered voters, four more than in 1935. There were 4,786 Republicans, a slight loss, while there were 5,212 Democrats, a slight gain. The county was Republican in 1935, but changed to Democratic in the primary last May.

Jefferson county reported a total of 1,190, a loss of 19 since 1935. There were 571 Republicans, a slight loss, and 609 Democrats, a gain of 47. This county also was Republican in 1935, but switched to Democratic in the May primary.

Wasco county remained in the Republican column, 4,221 to 2,286, but both parties showed small losses. The total registration was 6,567, a loss of almost 700.

In 1935 Republicans led the

Democrats by 41,000, but this margin was reduced to about 16,000 in the May primary. Election officials said that early returns showed the Democrats probably would reduce the margin even more.

Lane's Socialists To Oppose "316-17"

Lane county's socialists indicated Monday night that they will take a lead in opposing the "anti-labor" initiative 316-317. Plans were laid for a mass meeting October 25, when speakers will "expose" the bill, and a group of Young Socialists will give a skit showing what might happen in labor disputes if the bill were passed.

The Socialists also endorsed a housing authority for Eugene, offering to show the city council many uninhabitable buildings if needed to get the authority established. They declared that Eugene's housing conditions are disgraceful as its "attempts at labor-throttling."

New officers elected at the meeting were Albert Kaufman, chairman, and Prof. Roy Andrews, secretary-treasurer.
