California's Bears Rout Ducks, 20-0

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reversed over Oregon's left end for 12 and the third touchdown. Bottari's kick was blocked, and the scoring for the afternoon was over.

Ducks Come Back

Oregon, however, wasn't through playing. The Webfoot, coached by Tex Oliver, sent out a sophomore fullback named Marshall Stenstrom who started to tear the California line apart. In one drive he moved the ball 68 yards in half a dozen plays, marching to the California 17 as the third period ended. The Bears stopped that march on their four but they were backed up again shortly afterwards as Gebhardt and Stenstrom cut loose again.

Just then the Washington victory was broadcast, California snapped out of it to stop Oregon on its 22, and in the few minutes remaining California started a march that only the final whistle interrupted.

California started its second team against the visitors and Oregon spent most of the first period trying to score. The Bear seconds gained control in the second period but it took Bottari and his varsity mates to crack the Webfoot defense and produce the touchdowns. With the sensational Stenstrom gaining up 84 yards in his cut-backs off tackle, Oregon out-gained California on the ground, 152 yards to 123. But the Bears connected on five of their 12 passes for 93 yards and a yardage total of 216 for the day. Oregon, completing only three passes of 11 for 18 yards, totaled 170 yards.

First Downs Even

The first downs were even, each team getting 10 for the game.

Oregon had the advantage in punting, with an average of 35.2 yards a kick as against California's 30.5.

The game was exceptionally clean, with only three penalties, two for off-side and one on Oregon for taking too many times out.

There were seven fumbles, with the ball changing hands three times on three successive plays in the third period as backs, their hands stiff from the late afternoon chill, dropped the ball when hit by tacklers.

The game was the last for California before its "big game" with Stanford which winds up the Golden Bear regular season next Saturday. Oregon, stung by its fourth conference defeat, goes back home to meet Washington at Portland.

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yond the \$1,000 and actually expended \$4,000 in keeping the road open," Baldock said. "The revenue from gas tax totaled only approximately \$380 during the year, thus the cost of keeping the road open was far greater than the revenue from gasoline used by persons using the road."

The engineer explained that the degree of solvency in this sort of operation was not sufficient to warrant its continuation on the present basis.

However, as a means of engineering agreed to reimburse that at least \$1,000 be given this year. Cars will be again with the view of raising the revenue to the gas tax this year.
