Two More River Jobs Completed

Two Willamette river bank re-vestment contracts on the east side of the stream in the Goodpasture Island section are being completed by Jacobsen and Jensen, contractors and the equipment will probably be taken out some time next week, according to the U. S. army engineers here, in charge of the work.

The two projects cover a total distance of 7393 feet and the re-vestment was designed to protect a large acreage of valuable garden land adjoining the river. The work was started in October of this year and hardly a day has been missed on account of high water or bad weather.

The Kuckenberg, Construction company of Portland a short time ago completed two half-mile projects on the opposite side of the river further down stream.

The engineers said Tuesday that no additional projects are in contemplation in the near future but some time after the first of the year there may be some activity in that line, it was stated.

Two Boys In Jail On Theft Charges

Education Board Refinances OSC

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

No action was taken on the proposed three-year contract for Coach Lon Stiner of OSC as the athletic board of the college has not had time to prepare the recommendation and send it through the regular channels due to the coast conference meeting, according to President Peavy. It is understood the contract will come before the board at its next meeting.

Accepts Invitation
An invitation of the University of Oregon to hold the April meeting at Eugene was accepted. Chancellor F. M. Hunter reported the success of the recent campus Christian embassies to the major campuses, saying total attendance at the various meetings at the university amounted to about 10,000 and at the state college more than 14,000. He strongly endorsed the type of work accomplished.

The refinancing operation was in two parts. In one, the proposed loan of \$275,000 from the PWA on the \$500,000 chemistry building project was changed to a bond issue handled by the board directly at lower rates of interest. In the other the outstanding bonds of the memorial union building and the health service building, totaling \$211,000, were lumped together under a refunding program, also at lower rates.

The experiment station committee of the board, headed by Herman Oliver, was instructed to proceed with a study of the long-time land needs of the agricultural division of the State college and prepare a comprehensive plan for future development. This came up in connection with the leasing of additional land in Linn county for experiment station use.

Among other items passed upon were the following:
Approval of addition to the WPA improvement at the Eastern Oregon Normal school involving an additional outlay of \$1100.

For Increased Enrollment
Additional adjustments for the winter term to care for increased enrollment at the State college, \$2,380.

Acceptance of formal PWA offers for reconstructing the agricultural engineering building at OSC and increasing the grant and loan to the Eastern Oregon Normal dormitory building. All other building items recommended by the committee which met yesterday were approved.

Personnel adjustments included, for the university, resignation of Rex R. Rhoten, instructor in physics and physical science, and appointment of Lawrence G. Stoddard to succeed him; appointment of Harry S. Schenk as assistant professor of journalism, succeeding Arne Rae, granted leave of absence to become executive secretary of the National Editorial association for one year.

State college, resignation of E. M. Gibson as assistant professor of secretarial science and continuation of Mrs. Burton Hutton on temporary appointment. Gibson obtained a higher offer before assuming duties in Oregon it was explained.

sued a decree putting new obstacles in the way of Jews removing their property from Germany. The decree, declared to be necessary to prevent the flight of capital, forbids German or stateless Jews leaving Germany after January 1 from taking any object except those necessary for strictly personal use.

REQUEST APPROVED
PARIS, Dec. 13. (AP)—The chamber of deputies today approved Premier Daladier's request for emergency measures to speed passage of the ordinary and extraordinary budgets for 1939.

The measures, providing the appropriation bills be debated by ministries instead of by more detailed chapter divisions, were approved by a show of hands.

Even the socialists backed the government on the vote, which was purely technical and carried no indications of possible future support or opposition to the 1939 allocations.

CHINESE ADVANCE
SHANGHAI, Dec. 13. (AP)—Chinese troops reported today they had recovered virtually all the territory they lost in Hunan province since the Japanese occupation of Yochow November 12. Their latest asserted victories in the month-long counter-offensive included capture of three villages east of Yochow and two of them across the Hupeh province border to within three miles of Tungcheng.

They reported Sunday their forces farther to the west had advanced up the shore of Tungting lake to within five miles of Yochow.

Chinese advances also told of gains north of Hankow, former provisional capital, which is the base for operations on the Yochow front as well as those in Hupeh province to the west and north.

CLOSE TO CANTON
HONGKONG, Dec. 13. (AP)—Chinese troops were reported moving closer to Canton in a big semi-circle today causing the Japanese to withdraw into the city from previously conquered territory in south China.

Japanese sources said Kwangtung province authorities were recruiting additional troops under a new order from Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek to launch a counter-attack on the invaders.

City Dads Approve Parking Tag Reform

for making deliveries was referred to the police committee for study. It was suggested that in instances where stores had no alley entrances, loading zones might be established on the street, but that double parking would not be tolerated. The plan was advanced as a means of eliminating double parking which, when traffic lights are in operation here, would cause undue congestion of the streets, it was said.

In line with the traffic problem, City Engineer W. C. Clubb, Jr., suggested bicycles not be parked on sidewalks or streets, but that the city erect racks on vacant property outside a zone consisting of Willamette and Oak streets from Eleventh to Sixth. The matter was referred to police committee to work out details.

It was reported the state may make suggestions for uniform traffic regulations following installation of the traffic signals and that the city would attempt to conform to these regulations. If none is made, the city will go ahead with the suggestions now before the council.

Under the new building code, fire zones will be cut from four to three with building regulations applying to the three zones. The ordinance becomes effective in 30 days. The council also directed that after Dec. 15, fire trucks will not respond to calls outside a six-mile limit except for industrial fires and then only if the bond required by the city has been posted.

Mergers Suggested
Two suggestions regarding park, playground and juvenile department mergers were placed before the council. The city school district recommended the playground and juvenile departments be merged with a full-time director who would act as juvenile officer during the school term and playground director during the summer months. The council suggested another plan whereby the city park commission, playground commission and juvenile department all be merged under one commission with the one director. The proposals were referred to the chairmen of the judiciary, park and playground committees, Fred Lamb, C. C. Page and Arthur Hendershott for investigation. It was pointed out that the latter plan could be adopted without changes in the city budget.

The council approved an ordinance repealing a number of obsolete ordinances and another ordinance which takes the place of the many ordinances repealed in the plan to codify city ordinances as being prepared by the League of Oregon Cities.

Petition Presented
A petition presented by city bakers asking that house-to-house peddlers of bread be required to take out peddlers' licenses, was referred to the judiciary committee. Rooming house licenses of two establishments on East Broadway, recently raided and closed as houses of prostitution, were revoked by the council.

Louis Koppe, councilman-elect from the third ward, attended the meeting and was introduced by Councilman Hendershott, whom he will succeed after the first of the year.

Lake County Pioneer Dies in Eugene

Robert (Bob) McKee, one of the early settlers in Lake county, died Monday night at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Gaylord Godfrey, 228 Twelfth avenue west, at the age of 83. He was born in Ireland December 6, 1855, and came to the United States when one year old. He came to Lake county in 1875, where he was one of the first settlers in Goose Lake valley. He was also one of the first business men in Lakeview.

Mr. McKee married Edith

Snelling October 14, 1885, in Lakeview. Mrs. McKee died two months ago, on their fifty-third wedding anniversary. The couple had lived in Eugene for the past three years. A member of Lakeview lodge, No. 71, A. F. & A. M. Mr. McKee received his 50-year jewel four years ago.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Ethel lift of Independence and Mrs. Godfrey of Eugene; one son, Sam J. McKee of Salem; seven grandchildren; two great-grandchildren; and two half-brothers, William McKee and James McKee, both of Lakeview.

Funeral services will be held Thursday at 2 p. m. from the Branstetter-Simon chapel.
