### THE CASE FOR OPTIMISM

Maybe we have spent a little too much time lately listing the things that are wrong with the world. There are enough of them, heaven knows, to make an impressive list; but we can overdo pessimism very easily, and it does not hurt us to be reminded that there is another side to the picture.

So there is a good deal of interest in a little bulletin just sent out from the New York office of the Good Neighbor League, citing the reasons that exist for optimism.

The league feels that the race is making real progress in spite of all its troubles, and points out that this progress is nowhere so visible as in America. Among the encouraging facts on the horizon it lists these:

Since they signed the treaty of Ghent on Christmas Eve, 1814, the United States and England have maintained an unbroken peace—in spite of various incidents which gravely strained their relations.

The United States has made progress toward breaking down the barriers between nations, by signing trade agreements with 20 foreign countries during the last few years. From these agreements are coming closer economic relations and better understanding.

Transportation and communication facilities have so improved that journeys which used to take weeks now take days, and no part of the United States can be said to be isolated.

A generation or two ago, the ordinary workingman in America toiled 16 hours a day for very low pay. Today he works half of that time, gets a much higher wage, and has a standard of living which gives him comforts and luxuries that once were the exclusive privilege of the very wealthy.

Death rates have been reduced and the average life span has been doubled within the last century. Education, once the privilege of a very few, is now available to all. Differences in religious beliefs, once responsible for bitter divisions among the people, are no longer a problem in America; instead, leaders of Jews, Catholics and Protestants are working actively for harmony and better relations.

All of these things add up to a pretty impressive list. They have nothing to do with the dire problems which loom so large today; but for that very reason they are all the more encouraging, because they are enduring, continuing gains and not mere temporary changes in conditions.

Through them, one can see the development of a slow but steady rise in the well-being of the average man. His life has been growing more comfortable, his chance to use his God-given talents to the best advantage has been enlarged, his prospects for getting a little more happiness into his life are somewhat better. The different items in the list may not look so important, taken singly; added together, they show an amazing amount of progress.

And that is a fact which we must not lose sight of. Looking at the clouds on today's horizon, we may easily begin to feel that the whole world is going to pot. But underneath the surface, the general course of man's progress is upward.

### TESTING FOR DRUNKENNESS

Drunks behind the wheel are potential murderers and certainly drastic prosecution should follow wherever it is shown that a driver who figured in an accident was intoxicated.

But blood tests and other tests have not been shown to prove drunkenness conclusively in all cases. Doctors and courts still are looking for fool-proof proof.

A recent case in Toronto points up the fact that capacity to absorb alcohol without drunkenness ensuing varies with the individual.

According to a blood test, the driver of an auto that killed a man should have been absolutely drunk—unable to walk or answer questions. Yet the driver, said the coroner, appeared quite normal and showed no signs of drunkenness.

No drink at all while at the wheel of an auto is the safe rule, but science has yet to devise a sure-fire test for drunkenness.

### BRAVO, JOHN BULL

Our English cousins, ever conservative, are engaged in the good old American custom of debunking.

The targets are some of London's purse-poor peeresses who, for a fee, arrange that socially ambitious women be presented at court.

Some half a hundred applications for presentation to the king and queen have

been rejected by the Lord Chamberlain on the ground the applicants paid the peeresses to sponsor them.

Of course, the rejection slips will be couched in superlatively polite language. But it is to be hoped there will be enough sting in them to waken some of our good American friends to the absurdity of their positions as seekers after whatever prestige attaches to a court presentation.

### WASHINGTON LETTER

Early in the session of Congress the question of relief—reform of the present system—will be in order. And already the administration is making some hasty plans.

The problem splits into two questions. First, who has been responsible for the political scandals which have befouled the WPA? Second, how is this agency to be managed in the future? Neither question should be avoided. On the question of responsibility, there is little room for argument. Harry Hopkins was head of the WPA. But Harry Hopkins is not the political leader of the administration. He is and always has been a welfare worker with whom politics has been a secondary interest. He has been extremely close to the President. He would not dare undertake any political activities on his own initiative.

The political leader of this administration is the President.

Harry Hopkins and Jim Farley have been, in politics, merely his messenger boys. Whatever Harry Hopkins did he did with the full knowledge, and beyond a doubt, at the specific direction of the President.

One Man Only To Blame  
If there is any blame there is only one person to blame and that is Franklin D. Roosevelt. Everybody knows that. To put Harry Hopkins in the Commerce Department and suppose that has changed the situation at all is preposterous.

Now, on the question of future administration. It is now perfectly obvious that what is being planned—in spite of four years of experience with relief—is being planned hastily. The President is playing with the idea of county boards.

But on examination all he has in mind is more or less voluntary boards of citizens who can receive complaints and look into them. This means exactly nothing. The whole subject of relief needs now to be approached intelligently and with an understanding that it is to remain for many a year, though in changing degree.

At least a few things are known. They were known before the administration went into power. One is that the authority which raises and provides the money should spend it. Nothing could be more fatal than to have the money come from the federal government and spent by the state governments.

Local Communities Must Contribute  
Another is that the communities in which the money is spent must also provide a part of it. The people must feel the burden. The spending of money must not be a source of local prosperity, flowing in from outside from some unknown source. That makes for extravagance, folly, corruption.

A third is that relief money can be spent by only one kind of an organization—a professional organization, recruited by the most drastic civil service operations. It is an insult to the intelligence of the people to recruit a spending personnel by the grossest political methods and then heap them all into civil service. The statesman who cannot see the folly of committing his spending for relief to a political militia is doomed to the most ignominious disaster. It has never failed.

What does this all mean? It means complete reconstruction of the whole relief—approach and machine, local contributions upon an established formula, with national administration by a wholly new and professional organized personnel and the entire cost paid out of taxation.

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### AN EDITORIAL ON HEALTH

Chief among the leading causes in the men of death in medicine today is pneumonia. Therefore the most serious of the types of pneumonia so far as death is concerned were types 2 and 3. If, however, all of the other types are grouped together, they account for a great many cases and many deaths.

It has been said that one of the greatest advances in the past few years as far as pneumonia is concerned is the appreciation by the medical profession and by various community and public health organizations as to the seriousness of this disease and also the recognition of the manner in which special serums are helpful in its control.

In several states pneumonia control services have been established. When cases are found, studies are made to determine the type of pneumonia. Then, once the type has been determined by the use of a special agglutination test which most laboratories can make efficiently, comes the possibility of treating the patient with a serum which is developed particularly for that type of pneumonia.

Whereas in the past at least one-third of all of the people with pneumonia died of the disease, in some instances nowadays as few as three or four per cent of those affected by pneumonia die of the infection. One observer recently reported 100 cases of pneumonia representing five different types—all of which were treated with these rabbit serums—and only seven of the patients died.

Recently a study was made of more than 6500 cases of pneumonia and it was found that 50 per cent of these represented some of the extraordinary types and, indeed, that 30 per cent were divided among five types.

When the serum is used in these cases, the results are in many instances truly remarkable so that this contribution from the great laboratories of our country during 1938 is now recognized as being a significant contribution to the advancement of medical science.
