**Western Pine Orders Show Slight Decrease**  
 PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 13.—(U.S.)—Western pine lumber orders showed a 3 per cent decrease for the new year's holiday week, the Western Pine association reported today.  
 Shipments also dropped, but production registered a slight increase.  
 The week's figures: orders, 43,024,000 feet; shipments, 52,996,000 feet; lumber cut, 32,299,000 feet.  
 For the first week in 1938 orders totaled 48,271,000 feet, or 11 per cent higher than last week's total; shipments were 45,956,000 feet and production was only 15,710,000 feet, for the same number of mills.
