

Bethel Water District Election To Be Held Saturday At Schoolhouse

Commissioners To Be Named Also

BETHEL, Jan. 13.—(Special)—Election will be held January 14 in Bethel schoolhouse to decide whether the Bethel water district shall be formed. The forming of the district will provide residents of the community with city water for domestic purposes.

The proposed district is: Starting at Elmira road and Cleveland street, going north to the Southern Pacific right of way, following the south boundary of the right of way to lot 19 of Fruitvale plat then west to the Oregon Electric lines and south to Bethel road, then west about 300 feet beyond high-way 99, south to Zumwalt land grant, west to Elmira road, south to S. P. right-of-way, east to Cleveland street then north to the beginning.

Main lines will come off Blair street and run one and one-half miles on Bethel drive, a mile and a half on Elmira road and one

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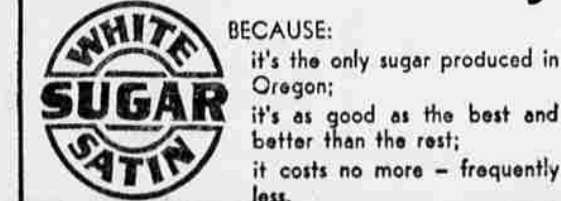
