Nine Willamette valley high schools sent Future Farmers of America parliamentary teams to Eugene Friday, Jan. 13, for the district parliamentary procedure contest and leadership school which is an annual event. The contest will begin at the Roosevelt Junior high school at 2 p. m., with teams drawing for places in rotation.

Forty-five F. F. A. boys from Salem, Silverton, Woodburn, Lebanon, Albany, Corvallis, Cottage Grove, Junction City and Eugene

will match wits in this contest which has grown from a local contest in eastern Oregon to a state-wide affair. Motions will fly thick and fast during the contest which is one to see which set of officers can conduct their meeting in the most businesslike manner. With one set of officers in the chair, the other 40 boys will take part in debate as floor members, and attempt to swamp the chairman with a multitude of technicalities, based on the standard authority "Robert's Rules of Order."

Judges for the contest will include Prof. John L. Casteel, professor of speech at the university, and Mr. Allison, social problems instructor at Eugene high. Earl R. Cooley, state supervisor

of agricultural education, Salem, will be in charge of the leadership school. Those particularly interested in parliamentary work are invited to attend the contest, which should be of special interest to members of social studies classes.
